This Bent Stands Hard Usage A new type of bent grass has joined the notable family of such grasses in Oregon. It was found growing in the Yoncalla region several years ago, and as it is being harvested for seed it has been given a definite name—Highland bent grass.

As described by G. R. Hyslop, chief in plant industry at Oregon State college, this grass has an unusually permanent system of underground runners or rhizomes. Its natural vigor plus these characteristics make it an excellent grass for football fields, polo fields, airports, and other places subjected to rough use and where Kentucky blue grass cannot be used.

This grass is being recommended in Oregon for pasture and erosion on some sour hill lands, in the western Oregon region of dry summers. About 60 acres are in seed production now and about 200 acres more are expected to be planted this season, says Hyslop.
