Pictures at the Liberty

The Coming Week

Air thrills abound in the pulse-stirring action of "Ace of Aces," realistic account of the tragic career of a great war ace, starring Richard Dix in the title role. Squadrons of fighting planes zooming, twisting and darting about in the sky; sensational crashes of burning planes; bullet-ridden ships disintegrating in mid-air; anti-aircraft warfare, and gallant adversaries meeting in mortal combat above the clouds, offer many breath-taking aerial thrills seldom seen on the screen. These scenes were all taken on the Academy grounds with the full co-operation of the U. S. military authorities. Col. Timothy J. Loneragan and Lieut. M. P. Echols were the technical advisers. The story is a romance of glorious youth and is filled with thrilling adventure and dramatic situations.
