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Red Devils Take Bull-Dogs Into Camp, 33-15

The doctor prescribed the diet, and the patient, Coquille High's basketball team, warded off all symptoms of basket hunger by stepping out to defeat the North Bend Bulldogs, 33 to 15, last Friday in the local Community Building.

The feasting Red Devils gobbled up a meager, unfattened Bulldog, however, as the attacked were without the valuable aid of players Mucus and Lind, lettermen and leading rushers of the canine outfit. This left only Smith of the 1934 kennels to carry the burden, and though this hoopster performed valiantly the load became too heavy for him. Desperately Vic Adams, North Bend coach, sent in all available men, but the flow of the attack could not be halted.

The Red Devils struck fast. Donaldson opened soon after the whistle with an arch from just behind the foul line. Rapidly, Robinson and Don Smith followed with one-handed thrusts from near the basket before a fast Coquille pace lessened a bit as the Bulldogs became settled, though still held at bay by the Hartley quintet.

Later Smith and Bailey counted free tosses, and Bailey sank a two pointer, bringing the score to 10 to 1, just before the quarter when the North Bend Smith sank his second foul conversion, making the count, 10 to 2.

In the second period, Donaldson ignited the howitzer guns, sinking long shots from far out, raising the count to 14 to 4. North Bend sank her only basket of the half before the halftime rest.

The last two sessions were interspersed with many fouls and substitutions, Coquille pulling further away with a 23 to 8 margin at the start of the fourth quarter. Ten more Red Devil tallies came in the last stretch, as compared to seven for the bay team. Many substitutes dotted both line-ups as the concluding whistle blew, and one, Yarbrough, a Red Devil, electrified the crowd with two long, pot shots which swished through the ring.

Louis Donaldson, with his three first half fuse igniting baskets, sparked the Coquille five, standing out as a floor performer, as well. The entire Red Devil line-up teamed well, showing much promise, and may go places despite a schedule of increasingly difficult games. Line-ups:

Moist Mash Treat for Hens

Hens appreciate an occasional treat in the form of moist mash and it is probable that the judicious use of a moist crumbly mash once a day will result in a slightly higher egg yield than can be obtained by an entirely dry mash system of feeding. The best practice in the use of the moist mash seems to be to moisten the regular dry-mash mixture with water or milk, giving about what the hens will clean up in 20 minutes. Soaked or germinated oats may be included with this.

Half-Pound Feed Per Egg

A hen requires about one-half pound of feed to produce an egg, according to New York State college poultrymen. They found that hens of six breeds in an egg-jing contest produced an average of 190.4 eggs and used 84.4 pounds of feed. The rations fed the hens consisted of corn meal, wheat middlings, bran, oats, alfalfa meal, dried milk, meat scraps, and a small amount of cod-liver oil and salt. When wet mash was fed it consisted of one part of water and fed on dry mash.

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Dairymen Want Control of Bang's Disease Continued

Coos county dairymen are in favor of continuing the federal government's plan of Bang's disease control, according to action taken at the annual meeting of the Coos county Dairymen's association, held in Coquille recently.

Resolutions were adopted at this meeting favoring the continuance of the federal Bang's disease control program, favoring a cheese marketing agreement for the state, favoring laws preventing importation into the state of other than Bang's disease free cattle except for immediate slaughter, and favoring a control law which would make testing for this disease compulsory, effective January 1, 1937, it was stated by County Agent Jenkins, assistant-secretary to the association.

The same officers that have served the dairy organization since its reorganization early last year were re-elected for 1935. These include J. N. Jacobsen, of Coquille, president; M. M. Schmidt, of Norway, vice president and George A. Maas, of Myrtle Point, secretary-treasurer.

In his report of the activities of the association during the past year, Jacobsen pointed out although the membership have been only 500 a year, the association has accumulated a very satisfactory balance and on his recommendation the membership fee for 1935 will be 25c. In commenting on this subject he stated that the association had no particular need for any large amount of funds but that a large membership should be encouraged by the lower fee, which would be valuable to the association in working on the 1935 program.

At the request of Lee Evans, of Bandon, action was taken by the dairymen requesting that the county agent's office assume the duties of acting as a clearing house for the purchase and sale of dairy cattle and other livestock. Evans pointed out that information made available in this way would be available not only to buyers of cattle but to the dairymen of the county and should bring about an equalization in prices paid for cattle in different parts of the county. In the discussion it was pointed out that it would be necessary for farmers or others having livestock for sale to report to that office and also that notice should be given there when the livestock is sold.

opening another quarry north of the Bay.

There were about 40 present at the dinner session who enjoyed hearing Judge McLain and the musical portion of the program. The latter was furnished by Mrs. Albertine Bond who rendered two delightful vocal solos, and Miss Muriel Dae whose violin selection was exquisitely rendered. Both ladies were accompanied by Mrs. M. O. Hawkins at the piano.

J. E. Norton, president of the Chamber of Commerce, gave a report on activities taken up and contemplated by the chamber this year, which have previously been mentioned in the Sentinel. He explained at some length the proposal to put a street between the river and the railroad, from the depot to the old Sitka mill, and the need for clearing up the waterfront, making it an asset instead of a liability. His idea was to have the shacks and boat houses removed, and a floating dock installed for the accommodation of river craft. To make the Coquille rival the Rogue as a fishing stream, and attract tourists, was the substance of his remarks. He knew there were salmon in the Coquille because he had caught them there.

Mayor Berg, next introduced, applauded the Chamber of Commerce projects and pledged the city's cooperation as far as possible. He also referred to the city's plan of replacing the wooden and steel mains of the city water system with iron pipe, using either S.E.R.A. or P.W.A. funds.

Mrs. R. A. Wernich, president of the Woman's Club, referred to the club's motto, "Without vision, the people perish," and said there was no prospect that Coquille would perish for that reason this year.

As Woman's Club projects, she mentioned that the ladies had been supporting the library for years, raising the money in different ways, and that this year their other project was the betterment of the Community Building. New support for the floor is one necessity and another which Mrs. Wernich mentioned is the need for ceiling the interior. We have all been disappointed at not hearing more clearly such programs as that presented by the Eugene Gleemen last November, and if the acoustics of the building can be improved by ceiling, it should be done. It would also make the building warmer.

But the Woman's Club has not the funds to improve the building, and Mrs. Wernich solicited the support of all clubs and societies in the worth while project.

Mrs. A. N. Gould, president of the Business & Professional Women's Club, had not been invited to talk, she said, the committee telling her that Judge McLain was to do the talking. She did pledge all possible co-operation for the B. P. W. in community improvement.

R. L. Stewart, president of the Lions Club, and Wm. Barrow, past president of the 29-30 Club, to which President Norton referred as a most useful, ambitious and live organization, both, briefly, promised all support possible.
