For Involuntary Manslaughter

Richard Jordan, part Indian, was bound over to the grand jury by Justice Bolt at Marshfield yesterday afternoon and is being held in the county jail in lieu of \$2500 bonds.

The charge and the cause for its filing are told in the following account from the Coos Bay Harbor:

Saturday night as people were leaving the dance in the Eagles hall, in Marshfield, Dick Jordan struck Nick Soini, causing him to fall backwards onto the pavement with such force that a basal skull fracture resulted. Jordan was arrested and held in the Marshfield jail while Soini was rushed to the Keizer hospital; where he died within an hour after being received. He was unconscious from the time his head struck the pavement, according to witnesses.

Soini has no relatives in Coos county and the only relative known is a sister named Mrs. J. W. Carlson, of Eureka, Cal.

District Attorney Flaxel filed a charge of involuntary manslaughter against Jordan, stating while many people actually witnessed the act, no one could be found who was willing to testify that Jordan had premeditated the act or gave any reason whatever that would justify filing a more serious charge.
