Parents' Co-operation Sought

In order to cut down the number of absences that plague high schools, the following information is being given to the public.

As every one knows, there is no law compelling a child to go to high school or a parent to send him. When he or she does come, however, we assume that they are doing so because they desire the benefits of an education. In order for a child to continue to attend they must obey the rules of the institution. Among the rules imposed by state law is that a student may be excused from school for only two reasons, sickness, and death in the family.

During the depression we in the local school have allowed an excused absence when a student has had an opportunity to work for wages and in some cases to help out at home. Trips, etc., we have also allowed when parents have called in advance and made arrangements.

In spite of the fact that we have been very reasonable in the matter, there have been a number of absences which, for want of a better term, must be characterized as "hooky." Often times it is impossible to detect such cases and it is especially so when the parents connive with the student by writing excuses, and protecting the pupil in other ways.

Absences of any kind cut down efficiency of the school and of the student. They make education a more expensive process than it ought normally to be. A certain number of absences are unavoidable and these we cannot help. We feel, however, that with a little more co-operation from the parents that we can cut down the present list tremendously. Please make an effort to have your son or daughter in school whenever it is at all possible. If for any reason other than those mentioned above, you believe it necessary to keep a child out, please call the office and explain. You will find us very willing to cooperate.
