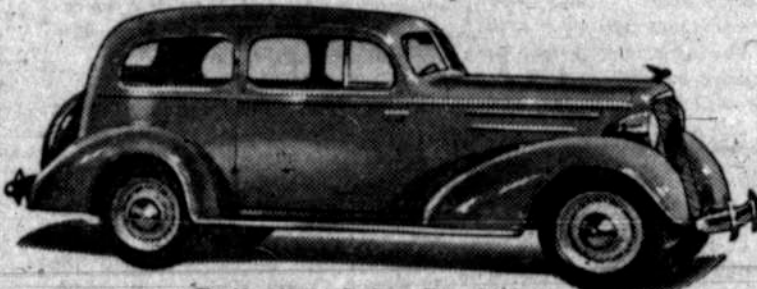

P. T. A. Held Interesting Meeting Yesterday

The P. T. A. held its session yesterday at the high school auditorium, with Mrs. A. O. Walker, president, in charge of the meeting. The membership committee reported an increase in membership. All students of the high school who are interested in the institutions of higher learning in the state will find catalogues in the superintendent's office. The rotating prize picture was won by Miss Grace Ellingsen's fourth grade. A program commemorating Founder's Day was conducted by Mrs. Inez Chase and Miss Maud Barry, with appropriate songs by the Junior High glee club, assisted by Miss Alfa Bang.

After the singing of "America the Beautiful," Miss Barry gave a short history of the Parent-Teachers Association movement, saying in part: "Birthdays are interesting occasions whether in the life of an individual or an organization. February 22, 1932, marked the 200th birthday of the Father of His Country; February 17, the 96th birthday of a national mother movement, now known as the Congress of Parents and Teachers. "Every effort to know children better and to give them more intelligent care manifests the living spirit of the pioneers who 36 years ago met in convention in Washington, D. C., and there resolved to be more worthy parents and to endeavor to bring all children into their rightful heritage. "Then the most popular bulletin issued by the U. S. government was on the care of the horse; now, it is on the care of the child. Thirty-six years ago the chasm between home and school was abyssal; today, a million and a half parents and teachers clasp hands and go forward together to solve the problems of a complex age. Thirty-six years ago science was

working to cure troubles which had already appeared; today, prevention is the cry of the hour."
