Mrs. J. R. Bunch gave a splendid talk on "Nutrition," which is given in part below:

"Is your child nourished physically and mentally? Malnutrition must be determined by a specialist, only he can determine defects. Overweight is not an indication of proper nourishment, more than likely it is the opposite. The factors of nutrition which build are: food, sunshine, fresh air and sleep. The food builds energy, furnishes repair material, and gives protective substance against bodily harm. The foods furnishing greater amount of vitamins most needed are milk, vegetables and citrus fruits.

"To have foods properly assimilated one must get plenty of sleep, sunshine and outdoor play. Fatigue and an emotional state retard assimilation.

"Rickets cause flat chests and may be remedied by codliver oil and plenty of sunshine. Rickets affect the bone and crowds the organs out of place.

"The responsibility of the school is to furnish active, happy play and to check up on a child's defects and report to the health nurse those whom she recommends for observation."
