### Baccalaureate Services Held Last Sunday Evening

The fifty-two members of the Coquille high school graduating class made a very charming appearance in their caps and gowns of gray, at the baccalaureate services, held in the Pioneer church last Sunday evening. The church auditorium, anterooms and balcony were also well filled with the relatives, friends and well wishers of those young ladies and men who are just finishing their public school life.

The processional and recessional, as well as the accompaniment for the anthems, rendered by a mixed chorus of high school students, were played by Miss Mary Lou Nozler.

Rev. G. A. Gray, who gave the scripture reading, read the first nineteen verses of the epistle of St. John, the first verse of which reads, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God."

Rev. Harold A. Minter, father of a member of the class, had been selected to deliver the baccalaureate sermon, and he prefaced his remarks with the statement that it was an event to which he had been looking forward for twelve years, ever since his daughter, Myrtle, had first entered school.

Referring to the class motto, Mr. Minter averred that it was impossible to "climb to character" without taking God into consideration in daily life.

Ignorance is man's chief enemy and a trained mind is an essential of a well-rounded life. The limit in any vocation or avocation has not yet been reached, and there is continual need for those who have the training to discover and give to the world the ideas, inventions and progress of the future.

Knowledge may be acquired in the hard school of experience, or through the easier medium of the school room. Intelligence is the application of knowledge, and the highest test of intelligence is shown by the ability to be courteous at all times and under all conditions.

The speaker's subject was "Personal Power," and the three powers he meant were education, intelligence and determination.

In extending an invitation to each member of the class to accept Jesus Christ as their personal savior, Mr. Minter declared that a burning and abiding faith in God and a tenacity of purpose in adhering to the teachings of Christ do not tend to make men and women narrow. It opens life to a fuller abundance of everything worth while than can any other power or force in the world.
