Oregon. There are 249 living in Coquille, 173 elsewhere in Oregon. Of the girls 158 have married and are raising families, and the survey showed that home economics was the most important in the whole school curriculum.

The list of occupations or professions being followed totals 38. Thirty are teachers. Office work comes next in popularity, while only 15 graduates are engaged in agricultural pursuits. Less than five per cent are at present unemployed, and 47 are attending institutions of higher learning.

The list of all those traced shows the 158 housewives, 54 in professions requiring higher education, 41 in trades, clerks, salesmen, managers, etc., 26 office workers, 22 mill operators, 15 agriculturists and a dozen engaged in logging.

In presenting the class to the school board for diploma presentation, Principal H. H. Hartley made a finer talk than we ever heard him make before, and he complimented the class on the work they had done. The presentation of diplomas was made by Dr. J. R. Bunch, chairman of the board of education.

Invocation and benediction were pronounced by Rev. W. S. Smith, after which the class, arrayed in their gray caps and gowns, lined up in front of the stage where they received the heart-felt congratulations of those who have been and still are deeply interested in them.
