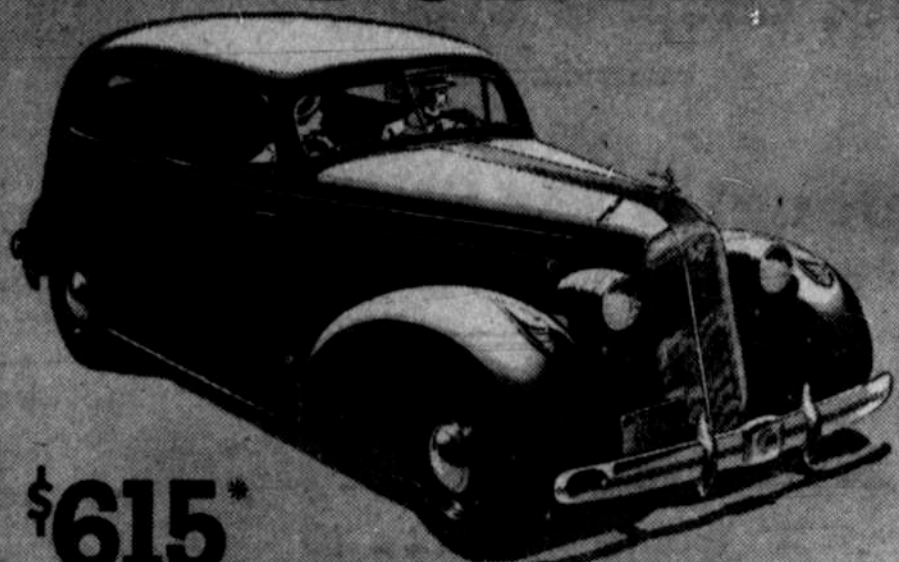

Take More Than Year

To Cross Pacific Ocean

Many of the Coquille people who have cottages along the Bandon beach have picked up a lot of the glass balls which have drifted across the Pacific from Japan. An item in last week's Ferndale, Calif., Enterprise gives an idea of how long it takes those balls, which vary from three or four inches to a foot or more in diameter, to cross the ocean. The Enterprise says:

Information received this week regarding the interesting glass balls found along the ocean shores here disclose that the spheres have been timed in their trip from Japan to this coast in from twelve to eighteen months. The speed of their 5000 to 6000 mile drifting journey in the Japan current is remarkable as tests with marked balls have shown. The new information was sent by Claude Birks, general superintendent of the Richmond Fisheries, who is now located for the summer season at Baranof Island, 35 miles southeast of Sitka, Alaska, where he is in charge of the herring reduction plants for the Richmond Fisheries. A portion of his letter states:

"The glass balls are used by Japanese fishermen in Japan and also by Japs fishing for crabs in the Bering Sea. The glass floats you have found have come from Japan by way of the Japanese current. Tests have been made by marked balls and timed from Japan to the U. S. in from 12 to 18 months. The balls are used in Japan in place of cork floats and in the Bering Sea are used with a small staff and flag to mark the crab traps."
