"Naughty Marietta" at Liberty Sunday Night

"Mary Jane's Pa," which shows at the Liberty Theatre tonight and Saturday, has Aline MacMahon and Guy Kibbe teamed again in the stellar roles. The picture is a whimsical story of a small town printer who is born with a wanderlust and who cannot resist the call of the road when a train whistles.
