Fish Plants at Bay

Receive Large Catches

They're counting fish by the ton in North Bend these days since the North Bend Fisheries got off to a head start in Coos Bay's new industry and began operations Wednesday in processing 175 tons of pilchards.

Three fishing craft, brought in the first loads early Wednesday morning which they had caught near the whistling buoy just outside the Coos Bay bar. The St. Anthony, captained by James Davis, brought in 30 tons; the Frances captained by B. Campagno, 75 tons, and the Pal, captained by Frank Lucido, also brought in 75 tons of the fish. The three boats ran into a big school of the fish and had little trouble in filling up the ship holds. The fish were caught with purse seines, a new kind of fishing here.

The handling and processing of the fish is worked by modern methods and proved very interesting to the citizens, who flocked to the dock and plant in such numbers it was necessary for the North Bend Fisheries plant to bar visitors in order to get the work done.—Coos Bay Harbor.

Ferry Traffic Increasing

Ferry traffic is increasing daily, giving Capt. Graham and crew about all they can do to keep the wharves clear. Speaking of the rumor that all night service would be given July 4th, Capt. Graham says he has not been advised of the order, but rather suspects he will be asked to run the ferry several hours overtime. Last week the ferry carried 8000 cars. This week ending Wednesday night 9610 cars and 23,065 passengers were handled. Capt. Graham anticipates June and July will show enormous increases.—Harbor.

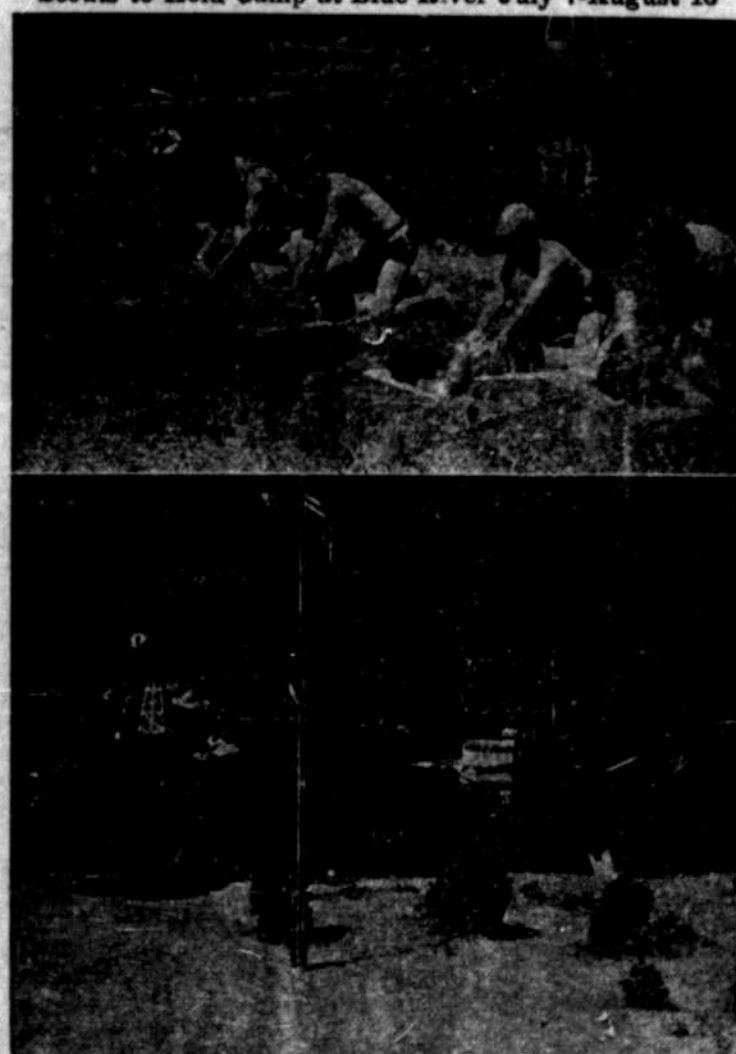
