Home Makers Camp to

Be Held at Eel Lake

The first annual home makers' vacation camp will be held for women of Coos county from July 31 to August 4 at Eel camp near Lakeside. This camp is arranged and directed by the Extension Service of the Oregon Agricultural College and is held for the purpose of providing a restful, inspiring and instructional vacation period at a minimum cost, according to information released at the county agricultural agent's office.

Any home maker in Coos county, from city or country, is eligible to register. It is pointed out, however, that the accommodations this year will care for no more than 40 women, and that the first to register will be enrolled for the camp.

Many interesting features will be available to the home makers attending this camp, including swimming, boating, camp fire programs, nature study, crafts, and an excellent library. The time of each person attending will be free for her to use as she chooses, it is stated: There will be no dish washing, or meal planning required of the campers, as an excellent cook and assistants have been employed for this purpose, according to George Jenkins, county agent, who is assisting with local arrangements. The cost to each member, according to the announcement, will be very small, and in addition each one will be asked to bring some produce from her home supply. Those who bring no produce will pay an additional fee.

Registration to attend this camp should be made as soon as possible and must be in the county agent's office not later than Wednesday, July 24. Members of the Home Extension council in Coos County can supply additional information regarding the camp and enrollment cards to those interested. This council includes Mrs. Lela McCue, of Bandon; Mrs. Grace Rackleff, Arago; Mrs. Ray Deadmond, of McKinley; Mrs. W. J. DeBoer, Gravel Ford; Mrs. H. D.
