### A Letter from Cecil Elwood in Mexico City

Cecil Elwood, who is with the Sperry special on a trip to Mexico, sends greetings to all his friends in this section in a letter to a friend in Marshfield, which the Sentinel is permitted to print. It gives some idea of that adjacent country which we of the United States know so little about:

Just a line to let you know how things are going, today I am feeling fine, yesterday I was a little low. There are a few of the crowd that are sick and several more feel pretty low. Vince Gillespi was nearly all in today.

Yesterday we went over to Cholula. This little town has 49 cathedrals and we visited two of them. One has 63 domes and an echo rings back and forth for minutes. The other was very rich in gold plate, valued at ten millions of American dollars. They say all of the cathedrals are finished the same way and all we have seen are that gorgeous.

From Cholula we went to Puebla, which is the third largest city in Mexico. Here we saw another famous cathedral and we did some shopping along the markets. This town is famous for its beautiful opyx works. We also visited the tile factory, where it's all hand-painted. On our way to Puebla, we could see the two volcanoes, all snow capped, and dozens of small volcanoes. The trip was perfect with real Spanish lunch at Puebla.

Today, Friday, we went to Taluca. Here we had lunch and these lunches

are Spanish. Some of the crowd (119 in all) could hardly eat the food as taste and smell are quite different from our American dishes.

We shopped at the markets for an hour or more and of all the places to see, this was one. The people are all Indians and the smell so strong we could hardly take it. More cathedrals here also. From there we went to the desert of Lions—no desert, no lions—but well worth our ride. It's an old monastery and prison.

The weather here is wonderful, not hot, not cold, rains every afternoon, thunder and plenty of lightning. So far we have been lucky about not getting wet. The country is fertile, corn is raised on the hills, in the bottoms and everywhere. There are no fences, cactus set in rows show the line of property.

Business here seems to be good. There is a great deal of building going on and new buildings are very modern.

If you can make this out, tell the boys at warehouse you heard from me.—Cecil.

### The Coming Week

Love and mystery form an intriguing combination in "Star of Midnight," romantic drama, starring William Powell and Ginger Rogers, which will be shown at the Liberty tonight and Saturday.

Telling a strikingly different love story, in which the delectable Miss Rogers, fresh from triumphs in the musical, "Roberta," is the pursuer, and Powell the ostensibly wary quarry, the picture deals with a baffling mystery in modern New York's pageant and glitter.
