Bandon Men Find Gold

Deposit Lost 40 Years Ago

Forty years ago on July 4th Ernest and Edward Divilbiss, of Bandon, then mining in the super Sixes river district in northern Curry county, discovered a rich ledge of gold-bearing quartz on the south fork of Sixes river.

They were mining several miles from there on Johnson creek, and for a holiday jaunt went down the south fork of Sixes prospecting. They ran across the ledge and took samples which they ground up and found rich in free gold. Several times later they returned to get more samples, and always they got a substantial showing of free gold. Then, busy at their Johnson creek property, for several years they let the Sixes river find rest, always, however, building vast aircastles of what they would do when they got around to develop it.

Finally the time came when they were ready to dig in and open up their fortune, but lo and behold, they couldn't find the ledge again. Five or six trips were made up and down that river bank at intervals of a few years, but without success. The floods of winter had changed the landscape and nothing looked the same.

It remained for the Fourth of July trip of 1935 to restore the lost find to these two miners. They took ten days off to make a final search and on the 4th of July, just 40 years to the day after their original discovery, they found it.

Ernest Divilbiss returned from the grounds this week and brought with him several samples from the long-sought ledge as well as a number of other good-looking samples of Galena ore. They have staked claims on the ledge of 40 years ago and plan to start prospecting it before the summer is over. The ledge has been traced some 3000 feet but has few outcroppings. It is between slate and porphyry walls—Western World.

Another Good Fight

Card at Marshfield

A re-match between Elmer Buzz Brown, Marshfield, and Leroy Gibson, the Wichita Wildcat, for ten rounds, for Friday night, July 26th, at the Marshfield armory arena, was announced this week by Promoter Tex Salkeld. The re-matching of the Gibson-Brown match should be one of the greatest fights seen in Coos Bay in years. Gibson stepped right out and won the Oregon State Lightweight championship from Brown on the last boxing card over the eight round route.

Brown with two more weeks to get himself in better condition, figures to win back his title, but there are plenty of fans who have seen the Wildcat in action, figure that Brown will be lucky if he stays the distance. They claim that Gibson all but knocked-out Brown in the last two rounds. Then on the other hand the Brown followers claim that Brown blew up in the early part of the fight trying to stop the rugged negro. Buzz dropped Gibson twice in the first round and it looked like curtains for the "Black Bomber."

Promoter Tex Salkeld figures that Brown who made his first fight in three months, should get another chance at the title. "He was willing to put it up for Gibson," claimed Tex, "so I signed Gibson to defend the title on the next card, if he won. I had Mike Stankovich in mind to box the winner, but the last fight was such a great one, that I am sure with more training for each boy, they will be able to travel a faster pace for ten rounds than they did for eight."

Tickets will go on sale at the usual places on July 24th. The same popular prices will prevail. Two six-round bouts and two four-round battles will complete the program. The balance of the program will be announced next week. Reservation can be made by phone to Tex Salkeld, care Hotel Chandler.
