House of David Shut

Loggers Out, 6 to 0

Once again the Israelite House of David was the master of the Coquille Loggers as they triumphed last Sunday, 6 to 0, behind the clever pitching of "Pee Wee" Bass, midget bewhiskered hurler, who threw the best baseball that has been tossed in these parts for some years.

Wisely, Manager John Tucker, had saved Bass, his best pitching bet, for the Coquille date. Long before the Davidites had reached our city their plot of revenge had been well planned, and the Loggers were truly on the spot. "Pee Wee" didn't disappoint his mates one bit, and the mates helped him many times by their great support in the field. Dick Atwell at short stop being especially a thorn in the local offensive by his consistent airtight work.

For themselves, the House outfit gathered enough runs in the fourth inning to win by driving in two, but a ninth frame barrage added an additional four. The fourth saw "Hub" Hansen open by singling off "Cocky" Brewer's glove. Roy Hutson followed with another blow which saw him reach second base as Hansen raced to third. Brewer's costly wild pitch let the first run in, and Hutson followed across the plate on Frank Cliff's infield bingle to Fischer.

When the ninth rolled around the whiskered boys were gifted nicely. Atwell was an easy out and John Tucker should have been likewise treated but Art Pulford dropped his fly ball and Tucker raced to second base. Catcher "Flip" Fleming scored the runner and ran to third when Brewer threw wild to the keystone sack. Bass was then an out on a grounder to "Cuck" Wirth, Fleming scoring. Andy Anderson tripped and Hansen homed before Hutson was an out to retire the side.

The Coquille scoring chances were few, what with Bass pitching and Atwell and the other fielders doing their duty. Once, in the sixth, Wirth tripled with no one out, and in the seventh Pulford was on second, but no other Logger advanced further.

"Cocky" Brewer did excellent hurling, but breaks were reversing unkindly for him. Until the ninth, the Davidites did not hit him hard, and at times "Cocky" had his opposition swinging badly or else looking soldier-like at curve pitches despite his lack of strike outs. At Christian Science Churches

"Sacrament" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, July 14. The Golden Text was, "Whether therefore ye eat, or drink, or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God." (1 Cor. 10:31).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "And he took bread, and gave thanks, and brake it . . . Likewise also the cup after supper, saying, This cup is the new testament in my blood, which is shed for you" (Luke 22: 19, 20).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "The spiritual essence of blood is sacrifice. The efficacy of Jesus' spiritual offering is infinitely greater than can be expressed by our sense of human blood . . . His true flesh and blood were his Life; and they truly eat his flesh and drink his blood, who partake of that divine Life." (p. 25).

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
