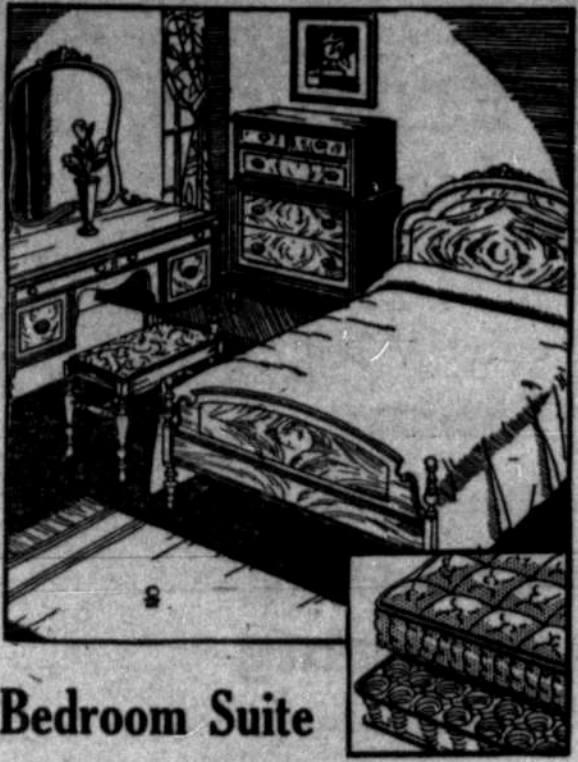

its pressed wood flooring, the veneer
blinds and the veneer. He in-
dicated that the department would
be interested in those items in the
equipping of postoffices.

The banquet in Masonic Hall last
Friday evening was attended by 120
ladies and gentlemen, many of whom
were Coquille people. The ladies of
the Eastern Star provided a splendid
menu for the occasion, the only fly in
the ointment being that they had set
up for 200.

Ray Jeub acted as toastmaster and
kept things going smoothly without
a dull moment during the two hours.
He even responded to the request
that he demonstrate how he won the
cow calling contest at the last corn
show, and was the subject of a good
laugh when Mr. Parkman, after lis-
tening to his stentorian voice for an
hour, referred to him as "Whispering
Bill."

Mr. Jeub did not hesitate, either, to
inject a little humor into the pro-
ceedings along political lines. He
called upon all present to introduce
themselves, giving their names, resi-
dence, position and in case of repub-
licans to so state. One postmaster
said he had held the office contin-
uously since 1893, virtuously adding
that he had voted for Al Smith and
Roosevelt. "There's a good republican
for you," was Mr. Jeub's come-
back, but it drew a laugh only from
the republican visitors.

There was one noticeable in the po-
litical affiliation announcements by
the postmasters. This was Duncan
Douglas, postmaster at Marshfield,
whose commission does not expire
until next March. He is being urged
to run as a candidate for the repub-
lican nomination for district attorney
of Coos county in the 1936 primary.

Music for the banquet was furnish-
ed by Miss Muriel Dae's string en-

plauded by the audience, and by Don
Estes and his orchestra who also
made a hit.

promptu. It was the postmasters'
quartet, led by "Swede" Nelson, of

Altogether the three-day sessions
of the postmasters here last week
was a most successful convention.
There were approximately 250 here,
including the first and second class
officials who met on Thursday, the
third and fourth class postmas-
ters, and their families.

It necessitated the throwing open

sleep in the street.
