"Air Hawks" To Be Shown at Liberty Tonight

The preview at the Liberty tonight and Saturday is "Air Hawks," in which Wiley Post, who was killed in that airplane accident in Alaska a week ago, plays an important part. The following story of the picture was written for publicity before Post and Will Rogers were killed:

Oil line gone! Tanks full of gas! Motor flaming hot! Landing gear dropped! If anything else would have happened to Wiley Post's plane when he made his recent unsuccessful effort to smash the transcontinental air records by flying cross-country in the stratosphere, it would have been absolutely no surprise to him.

"Within an hour of my take-off from Los Angeles, I knew I was in trouble," Post declared. "I had dropped my landing gear and planned to land on the fuselage in New York."

"I suddenly realized that my oil line was gone and I would have to land with my tanks full of gasoline. I shut off the motor at an altitude of 10,000 feet to give it a chance to cool before crashing. I glided down toward the surface of a dry lake and realized there was no way to tell which direction the wind was blowing. When it was too late to change my mind, I realized I was landing cross-wind. With all the possibilities of disaster flowing through my mind this was easily the longest moment of my flying career."

"When I touched the ground the

Shirley Temple seems to have no limit to her resources for winning and holding audiences. In one picture she dances, in another she sings; in some pictures she tugs at the heart strings of her audience, and in still others she sends them home roaring at her comedy antics.

But her newest starring picture, "Curly Top," which comes Sunday to the Liberty Theatre, combines all of Shirley Temple's many talents and adds still another. Shirley sings, dances, laughs—and plays Cupid in bringing sweethearts together.

"Curly Top" opens with scenes in an orphanage where Shirley is the irrepressible cut-up, forever getting into trouble and forever laughing herself out of it.

John Boles, the millionaire patron of the orphanage, adopts the child, who was won his heart with her gaiety and wholesomeness. But he also has to adopt her pet pony, her duck and her lovely grown sister, Rochelle Hudson, in the bargain.

The ensuing scenes of the film show how a romance grows up between John Boles and Miss Hudson and reaches its happy climax. And, when rifts or misunderstandings threaten, it's always Shirley who heals the breach.

Five sparkling tunes, all with music by the versatile Ray Henderson, were especially written for Shirley and the other members of the cast. Topping them are "When I Grow Up," "The Simple Things in Life," and Shirley's own tune, "Animal Crackers in My Soup."

Above all else W. C. Fields, screen comic, has a unique style of delivery which has endeared him to millions. Fields, who is starred in "Man on the Flying Trapeze," coming to the Liberty next Wednesday, declares he acquired his raspy voice as a youngster, and never has lost it. Few people know he started his career as a vocal comedian, turning to pantomime when he left for abroad. Paramount put him in a picture called, "International House." The public roared. He was given a film contract by Paramount and put upon his own, privileged to write his own pictures and his own dialogue. In "Man on the Flying Trapeze," Fields is seen as a shy, down-trodden clerk, browbeaten in the office and hen-pecked at home. The film tells how this "poor man" tries to sneak away from his office and his nagging wife and

Mott Will Name Two

October 26, 1935, a civil service examination will be held to determine eligible applicants for appointment to the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis, and the U. S. Military Academy at West Point.

The first congressional district of Oregon will have one vacancy at each academy in 1936. Congressman James W. Mott is anxious that all ambitious young men in the first district have an opportunity to try for these coveted appointments.

Any young unmarried man not less than sixteen years of age nor more than twenty years of age on April 1st may compete for the Annapolis appointment.

Candidates for the West Point vacancy are eligible for admission from the date they are seventeen until the day they become twenty-two years of age and must be unmarried.

In order to make the required arrangements it is necessary that the applicant notify Congressman James W. Mott at Salem, Oregon, not later than September 15th of his desire to participate in the examination.
