Supt. P. W. Lane Announces School Opening Plans

library. All former Coquille pupils in the High School and Lincoln School together with others who have already registered with Mr. Hartley should report at eight, forty-five in the auditorium.

No new registrations in the High School will be accepted except on Friday and Saturday, August 30 and 31, and after two-thirty o'clock on school days thereafter.

Pupils who desire to change their elective blanks completed in May should see Mr. Hartley on Friday or Saturday.

Parents should note carefully this notice regarding entrance into Grade 1. Those who reached the age of six years on or before December 1, 1935, are eligible for entrance this September. But there will be no February entrance and boys and girls who become six years after December 1 will enter school in September, 1936. Parents of first grade children are requested not to be in attendance in school rooms with their children on opening day.

Several changes will greet pupils upon their arrival. Consistent with the Board's policy of keeping buildings in good condition, several improvements have been completed. In the High School all class rooms on the first floor have been redecorated; adequate heat radiation has been installed in the assembly hall; a unit heater has been placed in the physics room; the home economics is now complete with the unit system for the teaching of cooking and sewing as recommended by the state.

Janitors have been busy getting the Lincoln and Washington buildings into tip top shape.

In the High School and Lincoln School the rotating schedule will be operated as usual. Latin I will be offered instead of French I and these languages will be alternated. A new course in office practice will

be given in the commercial department. Band will be given as a regular daily course and will be a credit course. Under Supervisor Bernath pupils in the High and Lincoln Schools may now receive expert band instruction. Earl Nosler has offered the loan of a \$200 music library and the Coquille Band has offered the loan of several instruments. For the first time both the home economics and typewriting courses will be given in double periods as required by state standards. General science will now be taught in the old Smith-Hughes room instead of in the basement and agriculture will be taught in a room nearer the shop. An application for the rebinding of several hundred books in the library is now on file with the SERA.

Merchants are requested to urge pupils in the High and Lincoln Schools to purchase only the 8x10 1/2 filler paper. This paper which has the single red margin line on the left and about 26 lines will be required for composition purposes. Certain uniform composition standards will be established throughout the school system and all upper grade teachers will be required to insist upon minimum English standards in all courses.

The high school cafeteria will operate as usual and will open for business on the first day of school. Lincoln School pupils are welcome to use this convenience. All cafeteria prices are at cost.

A new ruling by the State Athletic association now requires that no pupil may compete in athletics for any given semester unless he registers within the first two weeks of that semester. Boys who expect to go out for football should therefore register at the opening of school.

City Council Discusses Parking Problems Here

be sold at a lower rate of interest than six per cent, City Attorney Corby was instructed to secure a form from the bond attorneys in Portland who pass on the validity of all bond issues, the idea being that they would approve the legality of any proceedings they had prepared.

Councilman Medley was requested to investigate used ton trucks and report. The present Model T truck has been in use by the city about 15 years and the repair expense is becoming excessive.

A rooming house license was ordered issued to Miss Mildred O'Brien for the rooms above Tom Wing's restaurant.

An ancient document was brought to the council's attention which relieves the city, in case it so desires, of releasing any of the water in Rink creek. Back in 1903 all the property owners along that stream deeded all rights they might have had in it to the city, the price paid them being between \$1000 and \$1100. For several years the city has been allowing some of its storage supply to run down Rink creek, but attention of the property owners there is called to the fact that any rights they might have in that stream were given to the city 32 years ago. However, the city has not been, nor will it be arbitrary in the matter, and when the supply is sufficient the ranchers will be taken care of.

At present time there are several feet more in the reservoir at the Rink creek headwaters than there was a year ago at this time. City Engineer Stacer stated Monday evening that

there was a 32 foot depth in the lake. The surface is only three feet below the spillway.
