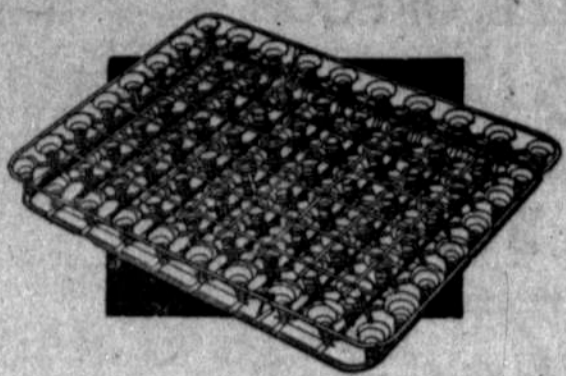

County Planning Board Meets Here Last Friday

The Coos county planning commission, recently appointed by Governor Martin, held its first meeting for the purpose of organizing, at the county court room in Coquille last Friday.

Judge Hugh McLain read communications from the federal planning headquarters explaining the duties of the county bodies, also the law under which these commissions operate. While they have no official capacity in Oregon they have an advisory purpose that takes in every phase of public life in the county, from relief work to county finances. Legislation giving commissions an official standing was introduced in the recent legislature but failed to pass. It is contemplated for the next session. In the meantime it is planned to co-operate with the federal agencies in an advisory capacity.

Dr. Everett Mings, prominent Marshfield surgeon, was elected chairman, and John D. Mullen, North Bend attorney, was chosen secretary. Members of the county board, named by the governor are: C. C.
