City's 1936 Budget Adopted By Council Last Monday

Mayor Berg and all councilmen were present for the regular session of the city council Monday evening at which time the budget for 1936 was approved, as prepared and published three weeks ago. No taxpayer was present to object to any of the budgeted amounts, and the amount to be raised by taxation was set at \$26,285.

The application of Everett Seeley and S. Gallas for permission to repair the oven at the rear of the Ideal Bakery was approved by the council.

Considerable discussion was had over the matter of additional parking space on Hall and Second streets, which could be accomplished by concreting between curb and sidewalk. Geo. Burr, Marc Shelley, S. M. Nosler and the city are willing to pay for the material if the work can be done as a WPA project, and the city engineer was instructed to confer with E. O. Howe and Mayor Berg, property owners on the east side of Hall, and with the Coquille Hospital and Farr & Elwood, owners on Second street, to ascertain if they wish to join this movement for street widening. Application to the WPA will be made by the city for as much of the property as the owners wish.

The engineer was also instructed to confer with the state highway engineer as to the department's attitude toward permanent sidewalk construction along the highway from Folsom's Grocery to the high school. The property owners for those seven blocks have been notified to repair the present walk, but even repaired it will last not much longer than a year.

The sidewalk is on the highway right-of-way, over which the highway department has complete control, but should anyone be injured because of defective walks the city would be held responsible. Just how this problem is to be worked out is not known, but the highway department is to be contacted first to learn if they have any suggestions for a safe and permanent walk for the students who must walk out there daily and for other pedestrians who use the highway.

The application of the Rex Taxern, in the W. O. W. corner, for a card room license was denied by a vote of 4 to 2. Councilmen Seeley and Leffevre favored granting a license; Councilmen Bryant, Belloni, Jeub and Medley opposed.

"Top Hat," the Feature at the Liberty, Opens Sunday

Fred Astaire and Ginger Rogers come to the screen as co-stars team in their fourth musical picture romance, "Top Hat," which features a score of lyrics and melodies by Irving Berlin. They introduce a new sensation ballroom dance in "Piccolino."

"Flying Down to Rio" brought Astaire and Miss Rogers together. They danced the famous "Carioca" and became a starring team by popular demand. Their next picture was "The Gay Divorcee," in which they introduced the "Continental," as a successor, to the "Carioca." "Roberta," in which they shared the spotlight with Irene Dunne, marked their third co-appearance.

In "Top Hat" Astaire and Ginger are the principals of a gay romance which unfolds in London and climaxes at the colorful European resort, the Lido. They introduce the new dance, "Piccolino," hailed as a more vibrant and exhilarating routine than either the "Carioca" or the "Continental." Said to be easily adaptable to the ballroom, it is expected to become the nation's most popular new dance. A mixed chorus of forty boys and forty girls executes

an ensemble arrangement of the "Piccolino" as a human rhythm background for the dancing stars.

The "Piccolino" is one of six numbers written by Irving Berlin for "Top Hat." The others are "No Strings," "Cheek to Cheek," "Get Thee Behind Me, Satan," "Top Hat" and "Isn't This a Lovely Day."

The melodies are logically introduced into the sequences of the story, thus affording an uninterrupted musical romance.
