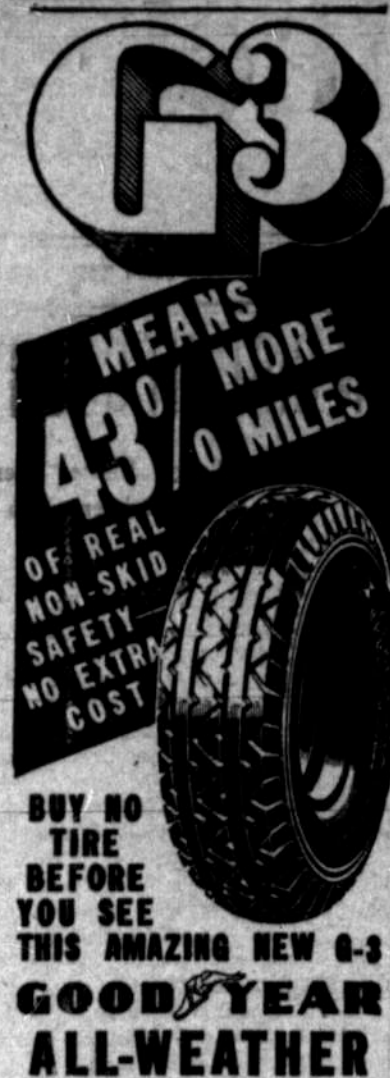




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Week's News From the Three Coquille Schools

High School

The students of the high school are very interested this week in their usual preparation for participation in the Corn Show. Four class floats will be entered in the parade, as well as a float from the Smith-Hughes department, and a Girls' League float. In addition, booths will be arranged by the home economics and commercial geography classes.

At the county institute on Monday of this week, Coquille was honored by having two elective offices filled by members of the school staff. Superintendent P. W. Lane was elected vice president of the county organization and Miss Esther Stahl was elected secretary-treasurer.

The junior class entertained last Friday evening with a barn dance held in the high school auditorium. The room was decorated in a most barn-like manner, complete to one small bantam rooster, and the guests were arrayed accordingly. The junior class is indebted to Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Highlights at Teachers' Institute at Bay Monday

A few points of interest from the County Teachers' Institute are listed. There are many others which space will not permit; also, some of the best work may have been carried on in the departmentals but those only are listed which came up in the general assembly.

Richard Hughes, principal of Harding building, Marshfield, was elected president of the county division; P. W. Lane, superintendent of Coquille schools, was elected vice president and Esther Stahl, commerce teacher, Coquille, as secretary-treasurer.

Dr. Victor Morris of the School of Economics from the University of Oregon, was the main speaker. Dr. Morris developed his speech about this main theme: "Whereas the problems of the 19th century were those of science, the problems of the 20th century are those of human relations. The fact that we have that problem with us today is, of course, due to the phenomenal advances made by science earlier."

The following are a few of the points which Dr. Morris used to build up the above theme: "Our monetary system broke down not through any lack of gold and silver but because of the maladjustment of human relations. During the last century when a young man finished high school or college, he was educated and would remain educated during the remainder of his career. This was true because he was entering a more or less static society, wherein values went unchanged from year to year. During this century one keeps abreast of the times only through constant study. Adult education is indicated. The curriculum has got to change in such a way that it has a practical relation to what the boy or girl will do later in life. Our school system must adjust itself to the fact that society and civilization is constantly progressing and changing and that we cannot educate our youth for the civilization that exists today, but must prepare them in such a way that they will most easily adapt themselves to the situation that will exist when they come to maturity."

In spite of the fact that under a dictatorship Italy and Germany have made enormous strides forward in their relative ranks among the nations, Dr. Morris still believes in democracy as a form of government. He feels that its supremacy lies in the fact of its intellectual superiority.

D. A. Emerson bore Dr. C. A. Howard's greetings to Coos county. He spoke on records, texts and courses of study.

One of the unusual presentations at the institute was the research committee's report in the form of a symposium. The members of this committee were P. W. Lane, Alice Finnie and Laura Brandon. Each made an individual report in an informal manner covering one phase of the subject of character education. The committee recommended that the study of character education be continued under the direction of school officials and teachers who had had long experience in Coos county.

H. H. Hartley presented the Objectives and Resolutions. These will be pear in next week's issue. Another matter of business was the explanation of teacher retirement by Richard Hughes. L. P. Linn presided throughout the business session with Dorothy Keating as secretary.

Mrs. Benjamin Ostlund, with Mrs. Herbert Busterud accompanying, very skillfully led the teachers in the singing. Her program featured the home.

Classes will be organized in both Living Writers and Economic Problems of the present program. University credit will be allowed. The regular fees are reduced for class group and special courses have been outlined for these study groups which require less writing on the part of students. No doubt there are many young people who have had to discontinue their work in college who would be interested.
