Facts About Tuberculosis

The Coos County Health Association is preparing for its annual drive on tuberculosis through the annual sale of Christmas Seals. Clarence Barton, Coquille attorney, has been selected as county chairman for this year's campaign.

Last year through the assistance of the funds received, the association sponsored fifteen school clinics. In addition to providing for the clinics, the association paid for all supplies used, and made possible forty-two x-ray examinations of students.

The dangers of tuberculosis are not realized by the average person. The deaths in the United States from tuberculosis in 1933 amounted to 74,836. Despite the fact that the death rate has declined from 202 per 100,000 living persons in 1900 to 60 in 1933, it is estimated that there are nine active cases for every annual death. Around 650,000 persons are sick with tuberculosis today.

The economic cost of this dreaded disease is enormous. About sixty per cent of all deaths from tuberculosis occur during the period of life from 15 to 45 when a person is of greatest economic value. Tuberculosis cuts off an average of one and one half years from the complete expectation of life of the people in the United States. Tuberculosis cost the United States government more than \$46,000,000 in 1932 for service connected compensation alone.

This year the association hopes, through the loyalty of Christmas Seal purchasers, to carry on the tremendous task of fighting the preventable disease.
