The County Court decided this week to purchase a heavy duty truck for use of the bridge department and the moving of heavy equipment, such as pile driver, gas shovel, lumber, etc.

Owing to the Transient Camp being located at Fairview, the districts near here have received more than their share of the benefits of this labor. But with more equipment, the court hopes to extend this labor to more distant parts of the county.
