B. P. W.'s Interesting Meeting

Frances Holmstrom and Henry Hartley were the principal speakers at B. & P. W. meeting last Monday. Mrs. Holmstrom, Coos county poetess, read several of her poems and told how some of them came to be written. Her poems have been published in some of the best publications in the United States.

Henry Hartley speaking on the subject of education stated that the public in general must change its concept of education if schools are to best help young people.

First, parents must get away from the idea that education is principally for utilitarian value. Parents are too prone to feel that extensive education is for the sole purpose of guaranteeing a good job.

Second, the public must realize that education is not left entirely to the school but rather the process of learning goes on from birth to death. The present conditions are changing so rapidly that in order to keep up one must study constantly.

Third, people must get away from the idea that education is simply an accumulation of facts—that students absorb knowledge as a blotting paper absorbs ink. Certain attitudes and self-reliance must be developed. Young people must be taught to think for themselves and in order to give time for this it will be necessary to change methods and, to eliminate some academic work being now given.

Mr. Hartley stated that he thought more attention should be given to the building of attitudes toward family relations and that this would help to prevent many broken homes. He further stated that modern life makes it necessary for us to prepare children for spending their leisure time.

In conclusion Mr. Hartley stated that an educated man is one who can most successfully adapt himself to the conditions he meets in life and retain his integrity and sense of proportion.

The music for the evening was furnished by Leona Coye and Barbara Ann Oderkirk, accompanied by Geraldine Ensle, pianist. Also the freshman-sophomore girls of the high school glee club sang. They were led by L. L. Bernath and accompanied by Phyllis Hall.

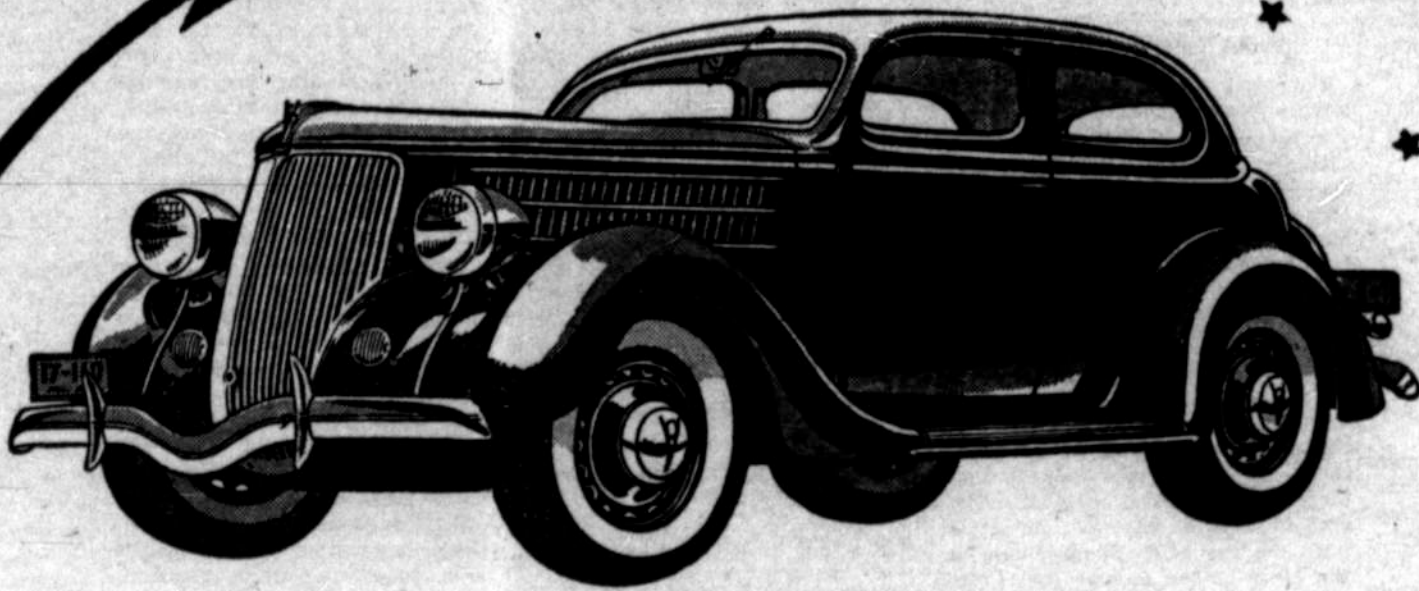
