Announces for State Senator

Charles Doane, of North Bend, Oregon, at present a member of the County court of Coos county, has announced his candidacy for joint state senator representing the eighth senatorial district. Mr. Doane explains that he knows of many instances where Coos and Curry counties need new legislation to protect taxpayers and others. Many laws are of the horse and buggy days and should be amended or be discarded. He also stated that he would support and work for the McGroarty bill, which is the Townsend Plan put into working order. It is a humanitarian plan and is a specific tax for a specific purpose.

Charles Doane is a young man with a vision, a young pioneer of southwestern Oregon, and he endorsed the Townsend plan 100 per cent. He has considerable real property in Coos and Curry counties. He expects the co-operation and support of the farmers, Townsendsites and Labor.

Mr. Doane said he hoped the republican party would endorse the McGroarty bill, temper their rugged individualism with co-operation and mercy and help return the United States to prosperity, which is the universal desire regardless of politics.

County Schoolmasters Meet

The Coos County School Masters' Club met last Saturday morning in the Coquille high school. Members from all schools in the county were present.

It was decided that pay of basketball officials will remain as it was last year: \$6.00 for two games and five cents per mile one way as traveling expense.

The committee from this district asked the group for an expression regarding the location of the tournament for this year. Marshfield seemed to be favored if it were possible to get an iron-clad contract for the use of the armory. Final choice of location rests with the committee.

It was suggested that the tournament date be the same as in 1935 in relation to the state tournament.

Myrtle Point was awarded the football championship for 1935.

It was suggested that soft ball be substituted for track as a spring sport. The idea met with some approval and some objection. The question was deferred until the spring meeting.

The group voted to hold an evening meeting the last of January or early in February, at which some speaker of interest from outside will be invited to talk.

Listed officials will be given preference in all league games.

It was decided that two rounds of "no decision" debates would be held, after which there will be a tournament for which a competent critic judge will be secured.
