Farmers Are Becoming Farm Record Conscious

Farmers of Coos county as well as of the entire state of Oregon are becoming more "farm record conscious" than ever before as shown by demand for record books and by personal inquiry regarding record-keeping methods, says County Agent Jenkins. Following the campaign a year ago to increase farm record keeping, distribution of the official Oregon extension service farm record book exceeded all previous totals, despite the free distribution of thousands of AAA account books.

The second week in January, from the 6 to 11, has again been designated as national farm inventory week, sponsored jointly by the American Bankers' Association, the federal Department of Agriculture and the State Extension services. Taking of a farm inventory is considered the keystone of any successful farm record system, says County Agent Jenkins.

Various record keeping forms are available at the county agent's office again this year, including one new booklet just issued by the state extension office entitled "Oregon Five-Year Farm Inventory Book," including farm map, net worth and budget forms. It contains blanks for making out these four items in farm record keeping over a five year period, and keeping them readily available in one book for comparison at any time.

Other forms available are the AAA record books and the more complete Oregon Farm record book. The latter and the new booklet sell at cost of printing—25c and 10c respectively—while the AAA book is free to contract signers.

Better farm business management, financial conditions, and changes in credit sources have greatly increased the use and need for farm inventories, says W. I. Myers, governor of the farm credit administration, in endorsing the national farm inventory week.

"Business houses always make a practice of taking a complete inventory at least once a year and they don't do it just for the fun of it," adds County Agent Jenkins. "It is the only way they can tell for sure their net worth and the extent of their profit, if any, over the past year. It is exactly the same way with a farmer. His bank account and his debts tell only part of the story. The inventory listing all property tells the rest."

emptions include: gross sales up to \$50 monthly; sales to United States, state, their agencies and subdivisions; sales of motor vehicle fuels, fresh sweet milk, canned milk, butter, eggs, cheese, raw unprocessed fruit and vegetables, meat, fish, unsweetened loaf bread, rolls and buns for consumption off premises.

Bill Authorizing Student Activity Fees in State Higher Educational Institutions—Purpose: To authorize the state board of higher education to levy and collect from the students in the Oregon State Agricultural College, the University of Oregon, and the State Normal Schools fees of not over \$5 per term, of approximately three months each, for development and promotion of recreational and cultural student activities; the funds so collected to be administered by such organizations as the board may designate.

Dairymen to Meet at Tillamook, Jan. 6-7

The detailed program for the forty-third annual meeting of the Oregon Dairymen's association shows two days of educational events scheduled for the convention at Tillamook January 6 and 7. Disease control, dairy products improvement, better breeding practices and the economic outlook are the four chief topics, the program shows.

The session will open Monday morning at ten o'clock, and soon afterwards President George H. Fullenwider of Carlton will deliver the annual president's address. Carl Haberlach, of Tillamook, one of the hosts to the convention, will describe the development of the Tillamook cheese industry. S. T. White, state director of agriculture, is the only other speaker on the morning program. Other speakers the first day are Dr. S. B. Foster of the Federal Bureau of Animal Industry; B. T. Simms of O. S. C.; Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, and Oscar Hagg. The annual banquet will be Monday evening.

On the second day's program will be Dr. James D. Brew of New York; A. E. Engbreton of Astoria; C. L. Starr, president of the Oregon Dairy Council; R. C. Jones, extension dairyman for the western states; P. M. Brandt, head of animal industries at Oregon State college, and L. R. Brethaupt, extension economist.

Students Fees Approved

Students of Oregon State college, before leaving for their Christmas vacation, left a record of their support of the student activity fee bill in the form of a sheaf of petitions asking voters to approve the bill to be voted on January 31, says Fred Fuhrman, who spent the holidays here and returned on New Year's day to O. S. C.

The petitions are being checked name by name to eliminate duplications or non-students. With many lists yet to count, 2045 names had been checked and verified, reports Jack Graham, president of the Associated Students.

Meanwhile Graham joined with Jack Blais, president of the University of Oregon student body, in appointing 50 student committees to do personal contact work in their home towns during the holidays in advocating approval of the measure which puts control of the activity fee question in the hands of the state board of higher education.
