Last Friday evening happened to be rather a bad night for a fire. However, the siren sounded and we answered in full force but were lucky in the fact that no damage was done. After filling chemical tanks and putting all equipment shipshape, we retired to our homes.

The wind howled and blew much harder; then all at once the lights dimmed and went out. That meant that the power was off. No one could tell for how long.

To the people, in modern times, to be without electricity is a great inconvenience, even for a short time.

Kind people, stop and think what it meant to you and the firemen you trust your homes and perhaps even your life to, on that particular Friday night. The power was off and consequently no matter how many times you might call central, she could not summon your firemen, whom you depend on for help against one of mankind's worst menaces.

However, while it may seem terrible at the first thought, there is really a simple solution to the problem. When a study hall or quarters have been established for the firemen, over, in, or reasonably close to the fire hall, you will have eliminated this particular Friday night danger, which may occur any night in the year.

Farm Loan Association to Hold Annual Meeting

All local farmers who are members and stockholders of the Coquille National Farm Loan association are urged by Secretary-Treasurer E. J. Tilley to attend the annual business meeting of their organization at Coquille on Tuesday, January 14, at ten o'clock.

Stockholding members will receive a full report on the operations of their association during the past year and will elect their board of directors for 1936. Each member is entitled to one vote for each share of stock owned, but no shareholder may cast more than 20 votes, regardless of the number of shares held.

"The success of any co-operative enterprise depends a lot on how well informed its members are," Mr. Tilley points out. "That is why we hope all stockholders will attend their annual meeting and take full part in the proceedings."

The Coquille National Farm Loan association is the local co-operative business organization through which farmers obtain long-term mortgage loans from the Federal Land bank at Spokane. Member-borrowers own stock in their association on the basis of one \$5 share for each \$100 borrowed, and the association in turn has a corresponding investment in the capital stock of the Land bank. The stock is pledged as additional security to loans which the association approves.

In this co-operative way, 58 member-borrowers have obtained approximately \$206,300.00 in mortgage loans through the association on favorable repayment terms at low actual cost.
