Interesting W. C. T. U. Meeting

Although last Friday proved to be a very wet day a fine "dry" meeting was enjoyed at the home of Mrs. Laddie Jayes when the local W. C. T. U. presented a temperance educational dry program.

The worship theme, "The Bible, Our Country's Need," included a fine discourse, prepared by the national director of religious education, Mrs. Harold Sloan, and given by Mrs. Fair in the absence of Mrs. Maud Bean. The Bible has won for itself a place among the greatest literary masterpieces. No other book has so influenced the world, and an educational system which ignores such influence is not preparing its students to meet the difficulties and to solve the problems of life.

"One of the amazing facts concerning the Bible is its ability to give help in any situation. It does not have to be changed to be up to date. Its principles have been proven sound for any age. It stands today as the only infallible guide for a confused world."

Mrs. Harriet Schaefer reviewed two different types of constitutional amendments, introduced in the senate last January by Senator Shepard, of Texas. One resolution was for national constitutional prohibition. It embodied the original eighteenth amendment with the substitution of "alcoholic" for "intoxicating." With this change there could be no controversy as to whether a beverage is intoxicating. Everything alcoholic would be intoxicating.

The other resolution was an enabling amendment which would empower congress to prohibit alcoholic liquors or not as it should see fit. This amendment would not enact prohibition but would merely give constitutional authority to congress to pass statutory prohibition. Also this amendment would make the question of prohibition a burning one in politics at every congressional election.

The difference between the two proposals is the difference between constitutional and statutory laws. Either resolution requires the same difficult majority to place it in the constitution but the national constitutional prohibition resolution provides for greater permanency.
