SOFT DRAPEY SILKS POPULAR IN PARIS

Midseason Openings Put Accent on Classic Weaves.

The soft drapery silks in simple, often classic weaves, shown in the Paris showings of midseason fashions have caused a return to a slender, often pencil-like silhouette. Silk satins in plain simple weaves, silk crepe and silk chiffons are the outstanding fabrics. The French couture's accent on pure silks in the midseason openings is due to their soft supple drape and the feeling of richness they impart, even when the weaves are most simple.

Among the soft silks that lend themselves to the draping treatment, which is so important in the mode, outstanding types include changeable silk crepe (very new). It has a mat surface which adds to its prestige, since mat surfaces are extremely important this season. Silk crepe in a plain color but with an irregular surface is also much in evidence.

A supple mat silk jersey is very much liked by designers. Among other types that drape to perfection are many lovely all-silk moires, also a double-surfaced silk satin and a soft-falling all-silk faille.

Schlaparelli launches a new heightened silhouette with skirt interest at the ankles, either in hobble treatments or flounces. Also seen in the new showings were slender, tall frocks with self-fabric scarfs wrapped about the shoulders or neckline and ending in elaborate fringe, for fringe in every width and form is one of the big gestures of the moment.

Million Dollar Timber Deal

One billion feet of fir and several million feet of Port Orford cedar in southwestern Oregon, owned by the California & Oregon Lumber company, which will require 35 years to log, were sold this week to J. R. Thompson and associates of Marshfield. The deal, said to be the largest in the state in recent years, is reported to have involved \$1,000,000, says a press dispatch.

The sale includes all Oregon-California holdings in Oregon and operations on these lands are expected to open new territory to foreign trade. The Thompson Timber company is being organized to handle development and shipments to the orient, Australia and South America.

Other activities will be at Brookings, and the Thompson company, expects harbor developments to facilitate foreign shipping from that port. During last year the J. R. Thompson Logging company shipped Oregon-California logs for export in six foreign bottoms from Brookings.

Marketability of timber in the southern Curry sector was demonstrated by last summer's operations, Thompson explained. Should the government build the 2000-foot breakwater sought, year-around loading of offshore vessels would be possible, he declared.

The United States coast guard and goodette survey boat, Guide, completed a dragline survey of the harbor and vicinity last summer for this purpose.

New equipment is planed for the Brookings mill for manufacture of export lumber in conjunction with selling logs. Extensive dock building at Brookings is to be started by the company soon.

Thompson and Norman Barnes, the latter foreign sales manager for the company, will leave Wednesday for the orient to study that market and sign contracts. Thompson, for many years a logging and mill operator in Marshfield, announced the new operations will not interfere with his local operation. Six offshore vessels are slated here before April 15 for his logs and lumber.
