which no opponent of the plan has been able to disprove.

Among the facts which were given in force by Dr. Williams are the following: "The rise in the nation age level." The Scripps Foundation of New York is authority for the fact that the national age level in the United States has gone up from twenty-five years in 1800 to fifty-four years in 1935. Add to this the fact that the machine age, over a period of ten years, has displaced man power so that one person now accomplishes the same work on the average that fifteen persons did ten years ago. Dr. Wilson submitted facts and figures to prove that the depression was brought on because "credit" was used instead of money as a medium of exchange. "Credit was contracted in 1929. The international banks called for this contraction of credit, thus a shortage of purchasing power was created. Then naturally followed the slump in all business and industry, resulting in unemployment, suffering and loss to the nation. Things have value only as they serve human needs. A tree in a forest which is inaccessible is of no value. If a railroad be built so that the tree can be turned into use it at once becomes valuable. Purchasing power must be restored to the American masses and not until then can we ever overcome the depression."

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First Dates in This Country

Early in the present century two experimental date orchards were established in the Coachella Valley, Calif., one at Mecca (in 1904), by the bureau of plant industry of the United States Department of Agriculture in co-operation with the horticultural department of the University of California, and the other in Indio (in 1907) by the bureau of plant industry. A large number of the best date varieties of the Old world have been tested in these gardens.
