(d) Was the religious education which I gave the child early such that he or she could make an adjustment without shock to the factual findings of science taught in the public school system?

(e) Has my child ever had reason to doubt the honesty of the adults in his own home?

(f) Was my early discipline such that the child came to adolescence with the ability of self-control and the power to inhibit (for himself) socially undesirable impulses?
