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Coquille High School News

The assembly program this Friday morning was in the form of a political rally staged by members of the two civics classes and directed by Mr. Osika. As the high school band played, "Hail, Hail, the Gang's All Here," the members of the populist and republican parties marched in with their banners and soapboxes. Nominations were then made for the offices of city officials to govern the city on the annual student government day. Nominees will be announced later, and in two weeks a general student body election will determine what students will fill the city offices on this day.

On Monday of this week Mrs. Anna Sullivan, school nurse, with the assistance of Mr. M. E. Wilson, county health officer, Mrs. Iris Elrod, county health nurse, Mrs. J. R. Bunch and Miss Gloria Getz gave the tuberculin skin test to all high school students who wished to take the test. The results were read on Wednesday. A very nominal charge of twenty-five cents has been set for the various tests being administered, and in case the students are unable to pay, the Ninety and Nine organization has volunteered to meet the expense.

Members of the senior English class have been visiting the various schools of the county in preparation for a general class project regarding educational facilities offered by Coos county.

Dr. D. V. Poling, of the Oregon State College, addressed the student body of Coquille high school at their regular assembly last Friday. He spoke on the advantages of higher education and talked more informally to members of the senior class.

Mrs. Inez Chase, treasurer for the three faculty plays, has submitted the financial report for the night of February eighteenth. Gross receipts, including candy sales, amounted to \$250.34. Expenses for the plays totaled \$79.24, which leaves a net balance of \$171.10 to be divided equally among the three schools of the system. The students and faculty are very grateful for the co-operation of the townspeople in supporting their production. While the audience did not quite reach the desired 1000 mark, nevertheless the hall was well filled, and there seemed very few empty seats.

High school debating between the various schools of the county is following a different plan this year. Representatives of the different schools meet their opposing of the other high schools in "non-decision" debates. Later a general debate tournament will be held with all schools participating, presided over by a critic judge. Coquille's affirmative team consists of Leville Walstrom and Robert Waggoner. These students debated Wednesday evening, February 19, against Bandon at Coquille and again this Wednesday against Marshfield at Marshfield. Coquille's negative team, consisting of June Hickam and Howard Hickam, debated Wednesday evening, February 19, against North Bend's affirmative team at North Bend, and on Wednesday, February 26, against Myrtle Point's affirmative team at Coquille. The question for debate this year is a most interesting one: Resolved, that the several states should enact legislation providing for a system of complete medical service available to all citizens at state expense.

Thirty-seven girls of Coquille high school journeyed to Coos River February 22 to attend a county Girls' League conference attended by representatives of the different high schools in the county.

Mrs. Walton's room won the P. T. A. picture again this month. They

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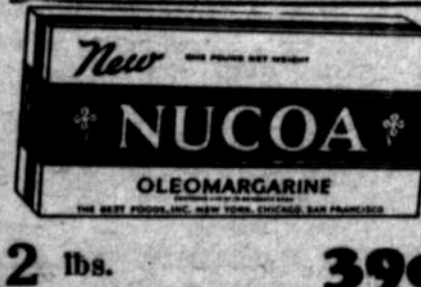
