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Lived in Oregon 86 Years
After rounding out eighty-nine years of useful life to the day, Chas. W. Zumwalt, venerable pioneer and prominent dairyman of northern Curry county, passed away quietly on his birthday, February 20, 1936, at the family home at Sixes, Oregon.

Coming to Oregon with his parents in 1850 at the age of three years, Mr. Zumwalt had the distinction of having lived in Oregon 76 years. For the first 19 he resided with his parents in the Santiam Valley, coming from there to southern Oregon. He was among the first to see the possibilities in dairying in northern Curry county. He took up a homestead in the Sixes area, later acquiring additional land until at present the Zumwalt holdings at Sixes number 870 acres, and are considered among the finest in southern Oregon.

Survivors include the widow, Mrs. Eleanor Zumwalt, and six sons: J. G. Zumwalt, Seattle, Wn.; C. P. Zumwalt, Coquille; M. R. Clarence, R. B. and Weston Zumwalt, Sixes, Oregon. Funeral services were held at the community church in Port Orford Saturday, February 22, at 2:00 p. m.—Western World.
