What Has Coos to Offer

Alfred Powers, state director of writing of The American Guide, is requesting material for the new publication. This is "a project designed to prepare in an encyclopaedic form, and to make accessible to the average citizen of the United States detailed information relative to his nation, his state, his county and city." All persons having bits of material pertaining to "historical sites, historical characters, living or dead, historical records, scenic spots of interest," etc. should send same in to the director.

In a pamphlet issued recently several interesting facts were included. One pertaining to Coos was: "North Bend has a population of 4012 and has no cemetery." This speaks well for the health of that city.

Farm Loan Assn. Active

E. J. Tilley, secretary-treasurer of the Bandon-Curry, South Curry, Coquille, Myrtle Point and Coos Bay national farm loan associations which recently joined in setting up a central office at Coquille, attended a conference last week with officers of the Federal Land bank of Spokane to discuss the problems of conducting the new group set-up.

Future responsibilities for making and serving Land bank loans will be carried by the local farm loan associations as part of the program aimed at decentralizing the district bank's operations and rebuilding this co-operative mortgage loan system around the farmer-owned and directed local units.

The five associations, which have employed Mr. Tilley as manager have 300 stockholding members and outstanding mortgage loans of approxi-

mately \$1,000,000. Their farmer members have an ownership interest of \$9500 in their association, gained by investing five per cent of the amount of their loans in association voting capital stock.

Due to the recent sale of a new issue of Land bank bonds bearing three per cent interest, the associations are now able to make new first mortgage loans at the record low rate of four per cent, with payments spread over a long term of years and amortized so the principal can be automatically paid off by the end of the loan period.

P. U. C. Officer in District

Marshall E. Nauman, field supervisor of motor transportation of Public Utilities Commission, in company with E. A. Van DeWalker, is making a tour through southwestern Oregon for the purpose of contacting motor carriers and to render whatever assistance is needed. Primarily Mr. Nauman is arranging for the establishment of headquarters in this district for Mr. Van DeWalker, who will be located at Medford.

This procedure is in line with the commissioner's recently announced program to co-operate and render every possible assistance to motor carriers operating under his jurisdiction. Both Mr. Nauman and Mr. Van DeWalker will be very glad to meet and co-operate with all operators and will be only too glad to give every assistance in adjusting any matters which are now difficult of understanding.

It is hoped that the placing of a representative in this field will be the means of a closer relationship between the motor carriers and the commission, and that in future the matter of compliance with the law will be more easily understood. This also will give every opportunity to motor carriers to consult with the

commission's representative and thus avoid the necessity of incurring expense and time for travel to Salem.

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
