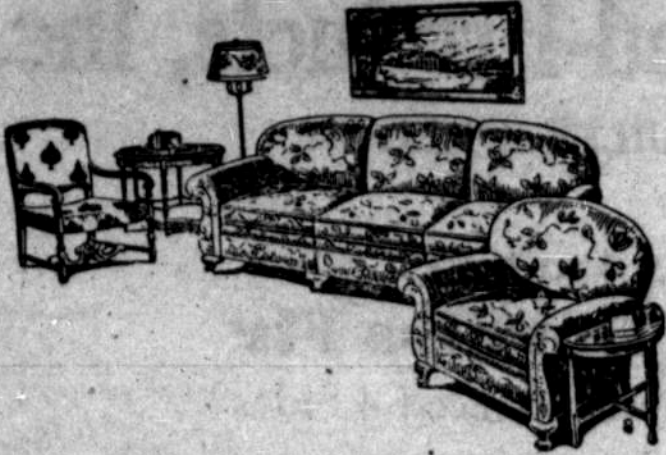

Riverton News

School Nurse Ends Duties Here

The executive board of the Coos County Public Health Association met at the city hall in Coquille Wednesday afternoon.

Mrs. Lela Elrod, county nurse, gave a comprehensive report on what had been accomplished in the various districts combatting measles, scarlet fever, etc., as well as immunizing clinics. Her report also showed that Coos county has the longest waiting list in the state of persons suffering from tuberculosis, who wish to enter the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium.

Mrs. Anna B. Sullivan has just terminated a two months' nursing program for Myrtle Point and Coquille, which had been arranged for by the County Health Association and the two school boards. In her report Mrs. Sullivan stated that the Schick test, which is to determine whether or not a child is susceptible to diphtheria, was given to 315, and the toxoid against diphtheria was given to 255 children. The tuberculin skin test was given to 364 children with 32 positive reactions, which is less than ten per cent and therefore under the state average. The board voted to extend Mrs. Sullivan's services to the larger rural schools for a month.

The treasurer, Mrs. Albert Pancoast, of Bridge, gave an incomplete report of the seal sale receipts as being \$835, which is slightly less than last year, with one or two outlying districts to hear from yet.

The board voted to send the president and one delegate to the State Tuberculosis Association at The Dalles.

Plans were begun for the annual spring meeting and election of officers.

L. A. Ashbaugh Passes

L. A. Ashbaugh, who had lived in and around Coquille until three months ago when he moved to a ranch near Myrtle Point, passed away at the Mast hospital on Tuesday, March 3. The funeral services will be held at the Schroeder Bros. Mortuaries in Coquille tomorrow, (Saturday), at 1:30 p. m.

Beside his widow he is survived by two sons, Earl Ashbaugh, of Coquille, and Louis, of Myrtle Point, and three daughters, Bernice, Verzena and Dorothy, all of Myrtle Point.

Jeub Presides at Council Meet

Ray Jeub occupied the mayor's chair at the council session Monday evening, Mayor Berg being in San Francisco. Ray handles the job in good shape and would be a worthy successor to Mr. Berg, who has unqualifiedly stated that he will not serve the city another term as head of the city government.

The most important matter discussed Monday evening was the procedure to be followed in planning for a better lighting of Coquille's business district. Practically all the business house proprietors are in favor of a change which will put Coquille in the same lighting class as many smaller towns in the state already are in.

A charter amendment authorizing the creation of a lighting district will be the first step and City Attorney Corby was instructed to prepare the necessary ordinance calling an election to be held at the same time as the state primary, May 15.

Under the terms of the proposed amendment the property involved can bond for installation of the system, the same as is now done under the Bancroft act for street improvements.

The ordinance setting the license fees for card rooms was adopted. Under its provisions card rooms must pay \$50 each six months for a license, and pool or billiard tables \$5 each six months. The latter is not an increase. The change in license fee will become effective June 30.

The street committee and engineer were instructed to segregate street assessments on lots owned jointly by Bert Folsom and the defunct Farmers & Merchants Bank.

The marshal was instructed to have old car bodies, chasses, engines and parts, which have been stored in the street and are an eyesore removed at once.

The hotel company was given permission to have alterations made in the building to accommodate the new coffee shop.

Coos' Early Day Railroad

A bit of early Coos county history has been sent in by the WPA writer for publication in the American Guide:

Indians, with straps about their heads to which lines were attached, furnished power for pulling the cars on the first railroad constructed in Coos county, Oregon. Later, when a locomotive was secured for the line, it lacked sufficient power to pull the traffic load, and passengers were frequently requisitioned to help push the train over the summit.

This first Coos county railroad, but two and one-half miles in length, connected the headwaters of Beaver slough with those of Isthmus inlet, and formed the only means of travel between the two ends of the county.

Besides handling freight and passengers this line hauled logs from Coaledo to Isthmus inlet. Logs were used for a road bed with strap iron surface for rails. Crude as it was, this railroad was a great improvement over transportation by human carrier, the natives having been so used by the pioneers who transported goods from this end of the county to the Bay.
