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Save Oregon Scenery

A strong plea to save Oregon scenery, not only because it is a valuable asset in attracting tourists, but because it is a heritage that should be preserved for posterity, was made by Robert W. Sawyer, publisher of the Bend Bulletin and former member of the state highway commission, at the Commonwealth conference, in session recently at the University of Oregon.

"What an advertisement for Oregon it would be if word went out that throughout the length and breadth of the state there was no barn, fence nor woodshed on which a sign could be found, that nowhere in the rural districts were there billboards or painted panels, and that the tourists who went to Oregon to enjoy scenery found scenery unspoiled and nature unadorned!" Mr. Sawyer said.

"No longer does the tourist inquire how the roads are in this or that section. He takes improved highways for granted. The thing he asks is 'what will I see when I get there?' Given the preservation of her scenery, Oregon can stand beside any

state in the Union. Let us then preserve that scenery."

Milk Hearing at Bay Saturday

Public hearings for the consideration of prices paid to producers and by consumers for milk and cream will be held by the Oregon Milk Control Board in all coastal counties the latter part of this week. Respect and Obedience to Law Talked at P. T. A.

ence to Constituted Authority." She opened her remarks by saying she had only two or three loves left, one of which was love of her country and how terribly it hurt to have to admit that America was the most lawless of nations. Miss Scott called attention to the fact that "Constituted Authority" meant government and that governments were instituted among men by men, that one could observe nearly all forms of government in active operation now—the one-man government in Italy and Germany, the government by a minority in Russia and a "Royal Family" in Great Britain, though there the ruling body is the House of Commons elected by the people.

Miss Scott stated that here we have many governing bodies, city, county, state and federal, but all consisting of groups of men and women elected by the people of each territorial division or appointed by elected officials. She then asked this question: should we then obey the laws made by these, our chosen officers? She gave illustrations of disobedience or disregard of law. Her first was stealing. Calling attention to one of the ten commandments, "Thou shalt not steal," she cited the conditions as to that offense in the high school some few years ago and the present improvement brought about probably by a change in public sentiment and a wiser handling of the student body now. Thieving, she regretted, was still practiced by young people in stores, restaurants, etc., and public sentiments seemed to be that theft was a clever act if you could get away with it. It was pointed out that condoning or endorsing pranks such as removing a barrier between upright behavior and greater criminality than stealing small articles.

Miss Scott then spoke of the reckless driving on our highways. She asked her listeners what constituted reckless driving and to what extent such drivers were willing to accept responsibility for the deaths and maiming of individuals resulting therefrom. Her final words dealt with the recent quarantine for scarlet fever. It was pointed out that Dr. Wilson was a properly constituted authority and fully within his rights in declaring such a quarantine. He could have no other motive than guarding the health of the children of Coquille. In some families he had full co-operation, in others the quarantine was broken in defiance of parents' orders. In spite of this the epidemic was checked and without a doubt suffering and perhaps more deaths than one prevented. Miss Scott closed her remarks by asking each family to question itself as to the extent it had contributed to the happy result.

The meeting was adjourned and refreshments were served by an able committee of fathers. Those serving were Bert Folsom, W. E. Bosserman, J. E. Axtell, H. H. Hartley, Ray Brown and H. E. Hess.
