District Deputy Henry Gustafson asked for more action on the petitions for the two important Grange bills, the state bank bill and the hydro-electric bill.

Arthur Brown, state grange deputy, talked on the two grange bills mentioned and on the encouraging growth and activity of the grange throughout the state. He also emphasized the importance of adhering to the grange principle of keeping out of Partisan politics.

The reports of several granges throughout the county showed much growth and interest in grange work in this county.

Getting Soil Conservation

Work Under Way in Coos

The provisions of the new soil conservation farm act will be explained to farmers in Coos county at a series of meetings which will be held at various points during the latter part of next week, starting about April 22, according to announcement released by George Jenkins, county agent.

The county will be districted into communities by the temporary county organization committee which includes W. E. Cross, Coquille; Ellis Dement, Myrtle Point; Frank Van Leuven, Bandon; Leonard Rood, Marshfield; Charles Saling, North Bend, and meetings will be held in each of these communities where the program will be explained in detail.

At each community meeting, a local committee of three will be elected by a vote of all farmers attending; the first elected to be the chairman who automatically becomes a member of the permanent county committee.

This new plan differs from the previous production control programs in that it does not call for a reduction in production but rather stimulating good farming practice by encouraging cutting down on production of soil depleting crops, and substituting soil

building crops.

Because of the speed with which the program has been set up this season, it will be impossible to answer all questions that will arise at these first meetings but it is the belief of County Agent Jenkins and other members of the State College service, who are charged with the task of laying the program before the farmers, that all information now at hand should be made available to growers without further delay.

All farmers of the county will be notified by letter of the exact time and place that these meetings will be held and since this is a long time program which may eventually effect most all farmers, good attendance is expected.

The various community meetings will be held at the time and place shown below:

Myrtle Point, (this date to be announced later).
Coquille, April 22, 8:00 p. m., circuit court room.

Marshfield, April 23, 1:30 p. m., city hall.

North Bend, April 23, 8:00 p. m., North Bayside hall.

Bandon, April 24, 8:00 p. m., Bandon high school.
