### Ox Team to be Feature at Coos Bay Bridge Celebration

The Coos Bay Bridge Celebration committee is arranging for a very novel and extensive parade, which will occur immediately after the formal dedication of the Coos Bay bridge at 2:00 p. m., Saturday, June 6. This parade will feature the various stages and development of transportation from the earliest days. It will be led by a bull or ox team, consisting of eight yoke or 16 head, a picture of which appears in this issue. This will be followed by a covered wagon drawn by two oxen, and that in turn by a six-horse stage coach, which is an authentic and original coach used in the early gold boom days of California. All of this is being furnished by Captain E. M. Simpson, and will be shipped by rail from Hood, California, for this particular occasion. Mr. Simpson has for many years past made as a hobby the collection of stage coaches and old-time vehicles of all sorts and description. In connection with his extensive ranches near Sacramento, Calif., he has been raising spotted saddle and stage coach horses and oxen. This hobby has developed into quite a business and various movie production companies have used all of his equipment in such pictures as "The Covered Wagon" and "The Ten Commandments."

Following these old-time methods of transportation in the parade will come the oldest makes of automobiles that can be secured, and will lead up through the varied, distinctive periods of development to the very latest that can be produced by the automotive industry.

The committee is offering substantial cash prizes, 1st, 2nd and 3rd, for decorated floats, decorated autos, and community units. These units may be arranged by the different communities in any form they choose. They will be open to advertising and can feature industrial, agricultural, or social activities in any manner possible. The committee is urging every community in Coos county and in neighboring counties to form local committees to arrange for having a decorated float and a community unit

entered in the Saturday parade. A whole section of the parade will be given over entirely to each city.

The committee further realizes that one of the greatest problems confronting them is that of housing, and they realize that Marshfield, North Bend, and Empire will not be able to take care of the tremendous crowds which will attend the celebration. It will, therefore, be necessary to direct people to neighboring communities to the north and to the south for a night's lodging. They are therefore very anxious that these communities organize a special committee on housing, whose duty it will be to list all of the rooms in not only boarding houses and hotels but in private residences so that the overflow can be properly housed and taken care of.

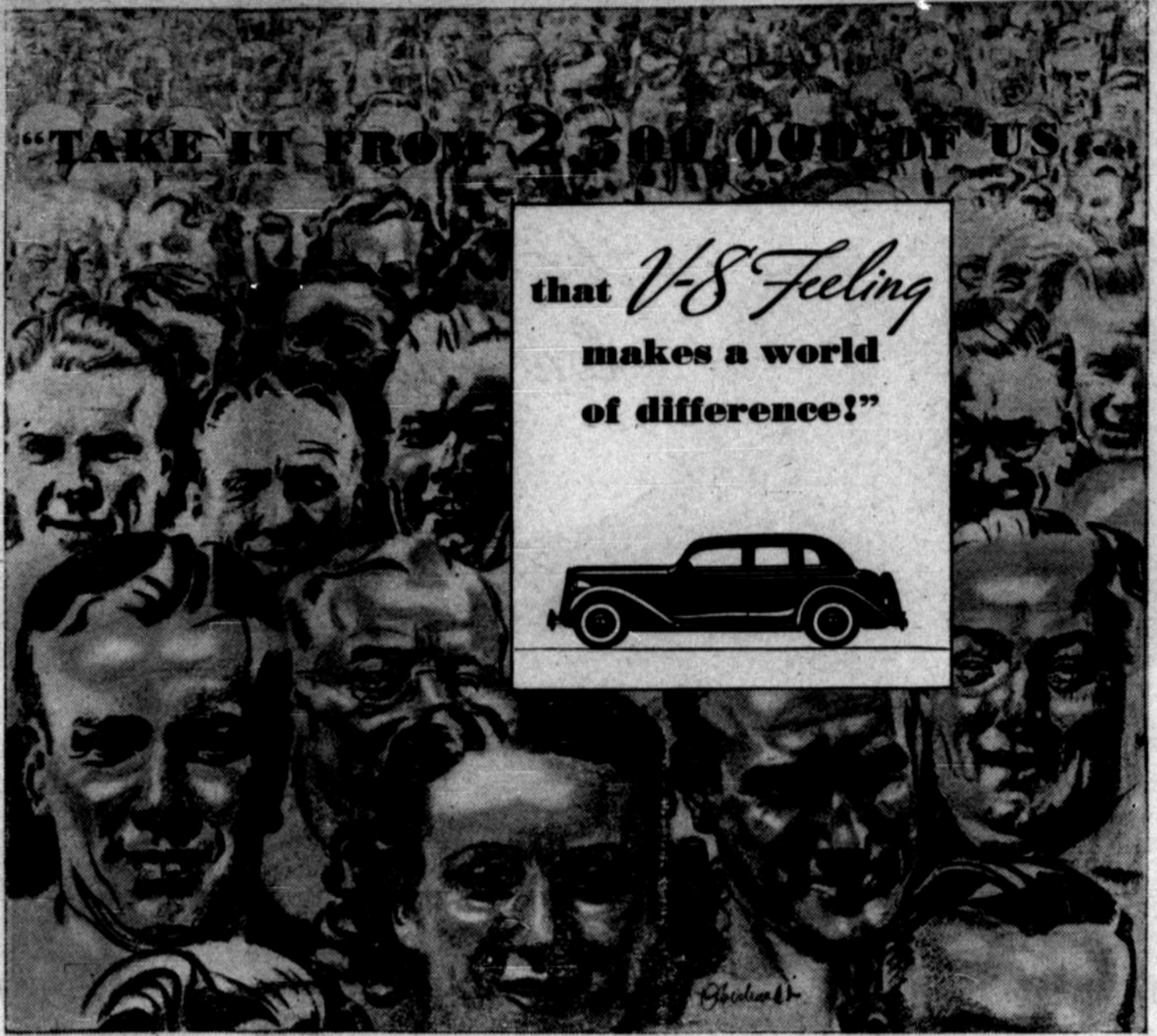
