Child Health Day

May Day has been proclaimed Child Health Day—a day set apart. A day when the entire nation focuses its attention upon the health of the child. These children are to determine the future of our nation. Somewhere among this group is the future president of our United States. From among this group will come the future statesmen, doctors, ministers, teachers. Children are important. They are our responsibility.

Never before has the community been so conscious of the needs of children. It knows that the undernourished child is more likely to become the victim of tuberculosis and is more susceptible to other infections both in childhood and in later years. It realizes that malnutrition which causes rickets may handicap a child for life. Lack of food or the wrong kind of food brings lasting ills to the

community as well as to the child and the family. There is a new appreciation of these vital facts.

We are all familiar with the old proverb: "An ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure." The surest means of preventing poor health or a retarded development is to provide liberal amounts of the right foods for our children. Parents must see to it but the child's food these days is everybody's concern.

Regardless of circumstances the child's diet must include milk and fruits and vegetables—preferably a quart of milk each day. Milk is a body-builder, supplying the calcium so essential for the boney framework and teeth.

Almost as important to the child as milk is cod-liver oil and sunshine—out-door sunshine. Sunshine does not take the place of milk, or any other food, but it does help the child grow and develop. For direct sunlight on the child's bare skin produces in his body vitamin D. And Vitamin D along with milk keeps the child from developing rickets.

Except that the form is usually different for the very young child, the same kinds of food may well be provided for the whole family. The little tot will not eat as much as the six-year old, of course, and the six-year-old will not have the big appetite that usually characterizes the boy of ten or twelve. But each and all of them should have milk and vegetables and fruits and eggs as often as the income will allow.

Let us make a consistent effort to safeguard mental and physical health of our children.
