Roy Garrett Died Last Friday

Roy F. Garrett, prominent landowner and logging operator of Coos county, passed away at the Magd Hospital, Friday, May 8, after a lingering illness.

Mr. Garrett was born at St. Helena, California Nov. 1, 1875. When he was a small boy the family moved to Humboldt county, California, where the greater part of his boyhood was spent. In October, 1899, the family came to Coos county, where they settled on a farm near Myrtle Point. Mr. Garrett was married to Miss Rose Chandler December 22, 1913. To this union one child was born, Margaret Rose.

In the death of Mr. Garrett Coos county loses one of its best loved and most respected citizens.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at two o'clock from the Schroeder Chapel, with Rev. W. S. Smith in charge. The surviving relatives to mourn their loss are his widow, Mrs. Rose Garrett, and daughter, Margaret; three brothers, Louis H. of Ferndale, California, Fred B. of Aurora, Oregon, Edwin O. of Monterey, California, and four sisters, Mrs. Lillian Dalton, Shasta City, California, Mrs. Neva Guerin, San Jose, California, Mrs. Linnie Carl, Monterey, California, and Mrs. E. A. Folsom, of Salem, Oregon.
