

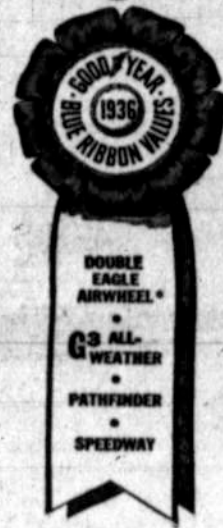

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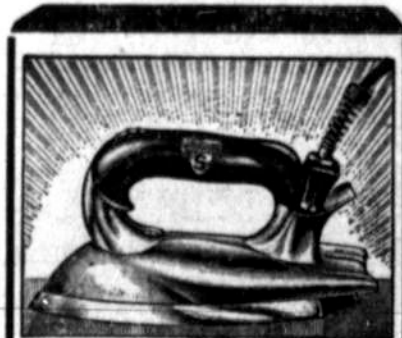

Empire Crabs Take Loggers Sunday by 5-4 Score

Two ringing ninth inning blows gave the Empire Crabs a 5 to 4 win over the Coquille Loggers last Sunday after the local tossers had fought up to knot the count in the eighth. They had trailed since the game's opening.

In the ninth, Wafford, as first man up, doubled. Following him Milosevich singled to drive in the winning run.

All of the other Empire runs came in the first when a combination of fluke hits, an error, and real blows produced the four scores. One run had scored on Chapman's double, a wild pitch, and an infield out when Eddie Foss muffed Pitcher Spencer's throw at second base on a force-out play. After this three more runners paraded home.

From then on until the ninth, Spencer was only in real trouble once more. This was in the third when runners were on third and second with one away. Foss threw a man out at first and then Spencer struck out a hitter to complete the canto.

Three hits couldn't produce a Coquille run in the fourth inning and in the sixth only one score came in as a result of a trio of singles.

Kolstad singled, sending Foss home and Baker to third and then Duncan hit. On the play the umpire called "Koly" out on a "runner hit by ball decision," ending the prospective rally.

Coquille tied it up in the ninth. Barton struck out, but Spencer singled to right field, was followed by Woodyard's triple to center. Fischer popped out to the first baseman with Calvert doubling to send in the knotting score. Foss grounded out.

Free Telephone Installation

It was announced today by the West Coast Telephone Company that service connection charges and installation charges for telephone installations would be suspended for the period of June 14 to June 30, inclusive. This is in the nature of a telephone sale and is somewhat of an unusual occurrence.

During this period the charges which are usually made to cover the cost of installing and establishing telephone services will not be collected from subscribers making application for service during that period. Orders for telephone service qualifying for installation without service connection charges will not be accepted before June 14 nor later than June 30. Orders placed between those dates will be installed without service connection charges regardless of whether the company can actually make installation of service between those two dates.

The response which the company has received to those telephone sales on three previous occasions has indicated that the general public looks forward to these events. To assist prospective subscribers in obtaining telephone service, all telephone employees of the West Coast Telephone Company are acting as telephone salesmen and will take any person's order for service during that period. All employees are prepared to answer questions concerning the details of the installation of service.

Installation charge will not only be suspended for this period on the installation of the first telephone in the house but they will also be suspended on the installation of convenient extension telephones. Further details
