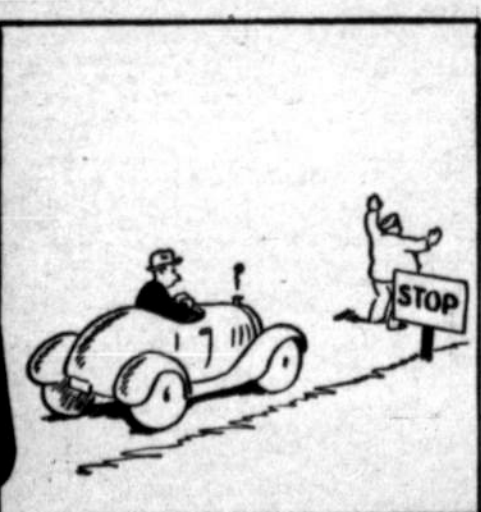

Clerk's Annual Report

At School Meeting

declared her duty as chairman of the board to be finished and called upon Dr. W. V. Glaisyer, the new chairman, to take charge. The latter named Mrs. A. N. Gould, Geo. Sherwood and Mrs. J. Arthur Berg as tellers.

Following is a portion of the clerk's annual report for the past year, as read by Mr. Bosserman:
Warrants outstanding a year ago, \$36,463.14; warrants outstanding now, \$41,269.12. Offsetting the greater part of this increase the cash on hand now is \$3,399.19 more than a year ago when it was \$8,870.53. The bond indebtedness has been reduced from \$54,000 to \$46,500 at this time. Total receipts for the year were \$92,268; total disbursements, \$79,998.28.

This means that the total indebtedness was decreased the past year from \$90,463.14 to \$87,769.12, with over \$12,000 on hand to further reduce it.

The total disbursements for the year were \$79,998.28, divided—general control, \$3,182.98; principals, \$4,378.50; teaching, \$24,873.99; operation of plant, \$4,473.94; maintenance and repairs, \$2,942.90; library books and supplies, \$73.43; insurance and rent, \$957.62; capital outlay, \$1,089.08; debt service, \$38,026.74.

The estimated value of the school buildings is \$90,000; of school grounds, \$15,000; of furniture and equipment, \$18,000.

The total number employed is 30, eleven men and nineteen women. One is the superintendent, three are principals, 23 are teachers and three are janitors.
