Summer Health Hints For Children

MOTHERS today recognize the vital importance of cleanliness in health, and frequently inquire how often they should bathe their babies during the summer. Babies should be given a full bath with a pure, mild, white soap and water, night and morning. They should be bathed whenever their hot diapers are changed and on hot days should be given quick sponge baths frequently. Of course, they should be dried thoroughly, but gently. Remember, their skin is tender and will not stand vigorous rubbing. That is why a pure, mild, white soap is so important. They should be powdered lightly with talcum, but be careful that the baby's mouth and nose are protected, to prevent him from inhaling the powder.

Older children should be permitted to bathe as frequently as they wish, provided they do not bathe immediately after eating, and do not become chilled. They should, of course, have at least one bath with warm water and soap each day. Since children play out of doors almost exclusively in warm weather and wear little clothing, a bath after playing, with a generous lather of soap, is indicated.

Of course, children, like grown-ups, should wash their hands thoroughly before they eat, when they leave the lavatory, and before retiring.

Cleanliness is the greatest defender of health against illness and communicable diseases, and cleanliness is within the reach of all. Soap is cheap and water is plentiful. The will to be clean is all that we have to supply.
