Enlistments Possible in Marines

The enlistment of young men for the U. S. Marine Corps in the immediate future has been authorized to fill occurring vacancies, according to information received by Postmaster Hawkins from Captain James B. Hardie, in charge of Marine Corps recruiting activities in Portland.

These young men will be accepted mainly from the states of Oregon, Idaho, Wyoming and Southern Washington. These men will serve as replacements on the far flung foreign shore stations, in navy yards, and on ships and airplane carriers of the U. S. fleet. Those qualified will also have an opportunity to serve with the Fleet Marine Force, a specially trained organization for military duty with the fleet said to be the finest in the world.

Applications for enlistment are invited from young men who are interested in the opportunities of travel, adventure and education with the Marines.

Price of Milk Advances One Cent in Coquille

(Continued from Page One)

since the consuming public realizes that milk is their best food bargain," stated Edgar W. Smith, chairman.

The new schedule of minimum prices, the first advance in the price of milk in many sections for more than three years, will mean more money to all producers and will bring about needed adjustment for distributors in meeting advanced labor, material and equipment costs which have arisen steadily the past several months, it was pointed out.

Both producer and distributor have been operating at a loss in view of advancing costs in all other lines, it was brought out at the public hearings, and milk is declared to be the most economical food in local mar-

kets today.

The new order places four per cent milk at nine cents wholesale, 11 cents per quart, seven cents per pint, retail; five per cent milk at 10 cents wholesale, 12 cents retail; skim milk at four cents wholesale and five cents retail. The order established light cream at 20-22 per cent butterfat at 13 cents half pint, wholesale, and 15 cents, retail; heavy cream, 30-33 per cent butterfat at 17 cents wholesale and 19 cents retail. The order eliminates all combination prices, discounts, rebates, gratuities and forbids price differentials between over-the-counter and home-delivery sales.

Meetings are being held by producers, producer-distributors and distributors in all sections of the state this week with field representatives of the Oregon Milk Control board to acquaint everyone in the industry of all the provisions of the new order.

An exceedingly versatile Irene Dunne is seen in "Show Boat," coming to the Liberty Sunday for a three-day run. Heretofore Miss Dunne has been described as "charming" and "patrician." She gained these attributes with her performances in "Cimarron," "Back Street," "Roberta" and "Magnificent Obsession."

Now she will also be known as provocative, mirthful, almost mercurial. Irene Dunne proved in "Show Boat" that she could make a dramatic scene throb with dynamic force.

Then she went beyond that. She gave her songs the thrill of romance in her sequences with Allan Jones. She took on the personality of a winsome blonde dancer in the show boat scenes and sent a banjo over hurdles of harmony in the bargain.

But the greatest surprise was her appearance as a modern Topsy. In blackface with kinky hair and shuffling steps, Irene showed a new ability as an actress. She out-topped Topsy. She danced with carefree abandon, played music that vibrated like jungle drums. She sang and scampered, leaped and laughed like an imp on the golden stair as she presented the gay number, "Gallivantin' Around."

Miss Dunne said of her "Show Boat" role, "It was such a satisfaction, doing Magnolia on the screen, after I had played it on the stage. The film script gave me new opportunities to carry the character beyond the period of the original production."
