

### Loggers Break Even With Klamath Falls in Two Games

Sooner or later Bob Wiltshire, of Eugene and Toledo, the University of Oregon and the Willamette Valley, is going to be able to write his own ticket to Coquille, because Bill Fortier's favorite "ringer" has won another victory for the Loggers, this time setting aside the Klamath Falls Red Sox, 12 to 1.

Coquille lost the first game of the two-game series when Joe Spencer dopped a pitching duel to Carlstrom, ace of the Red Sox staff, 4 to 0, on Saturday, the fourth of July, at Bandon, but Wiltshire pulled through before the local fans in the Sunday contest here. It was a great two-day series.

A home run produced the only run scored against Wiltshire. Other-

wise he had the Red Sox so at his mercy that only two other runners reached third, no more got as far as second, and only eight stepped on the first sack. Only once were hits bunched, this in the ninth when two singles put men on first and third with only one away. Wiltshire then got down to work to strike out one batter and throw the other out at first.

Behind the Eugenic, the Loggers played like demons. Ray Woodyard was a mad man with his bat as the box score shows, while all locals hit at least once with the lone exception of Arthur Ernest Pulford. Marion Fischer played a marvelous game at second base and his one boot produced no bad effects. Every Coquille player had something to do in this overwhelming victory which saw Hogan, a Washington State College

star, and Turpin, protege nephew of Hal Turpin, shelled from the mound. Joe Spencer lost another tough one on Saturday despite the fact that he chucked a great ball game. The Loggers did not have on their hitting clothes which, together with some shaky support, didn't give Spencer the aid he deserved.

Carlstrom, the winning Red Sox pitcher, is one of the Southern Oregon's best. He had the Loggers well baffled, as his twelve strike-outs will show. Lineups:

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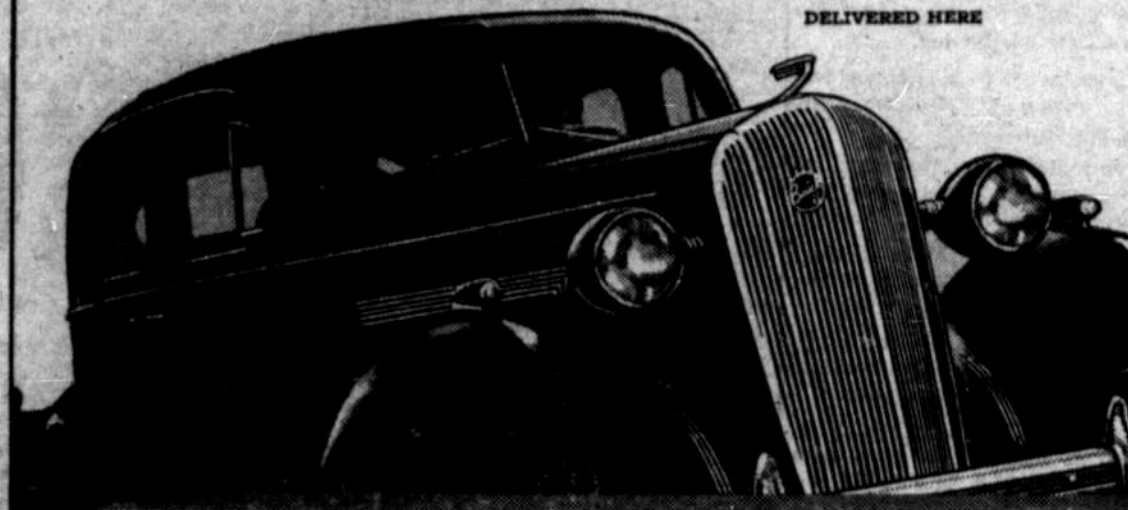

#### UNDER THE BLEACHERS

Apparently Bill Fortier can't go wrong on Bob Wiltshire, the slim Eugenic, who has come to the Loggers for three games in three years and has returned to Eugene with three victories. Bill should try to hire Bob permanently but, though we don't know for sure not having asked Mr. Fortier, he seems to be so well settled in his home town he doesn't want to leave. Maybe, too, there are other reasons, but if so they're unknown.

Anyway Wiltshire goes great guns for Coquille. On July 8, 1934, he was here for the initial time to face the famous Israelite House of David. That day Bob won his game, 5 to 1, letting the whiskers down with five hits, four of which came in the first three innings. Bob had great support, including a towering first frame home run by Glenn Murray with two runners ahead of him and some great work by Marion Fischer, who fielded brilliantly and got three singles in four ups.

Last September, on the first day of that month, the second Wiltshire victory came at the expense of the Detroit Colored Giants, 8 to 3, with Bob allowing six blows. Again faultless support was given the pitcher, and hard hitting by the Loggers put the colored lads to rout early, the first two batters, in fact, "Chuck" Wirth, and Hal Sowers, slamming out home

runs. And now Wiltshire has made his 1936 invasion and has won his game, for on Sunday he put away the Klamath Falls Red Sox.

If that isn't real hurling for a pitcher who comes quite a few miles to work the game among strange surroundings, I miss my guess, gents. Bob Wiltshire is still a youngster in baseball, having been a freshman at U. of O. in 1934, so he's still got time to go places in baseball if things break for him.

Allan "Lefty" Bailey, known popularly as "Junior" Bailey, just has to come in for some real notice. The little fellow got a break in the Loggers' game with the Detroit Colored Giants when Otto Kolstad was overtaken by illness and he's been going ever since.

His record includes four games in which he has fielded faultlessly by taking forty-three putouts and one assist while miffing not once. With the bat he has been up 18 times and has 3 runs and 4 hits.

It's all the more remarkable when you consider that Allan had seen no game action and little practice until

he made his initial start against the Detroit club. Illness had held him up, but once he was ready he stepped right in to supplant the ailing Kolstad. As a result Kolly has a job on his hands to regain the post.

A first baseman has a tough job on his hands, what with all types of throws coming his way. Generally a tall man is considered best for the assignment, but size doesn't bother Bailey. He gets everything tossed at him, high, low, or indifferent.

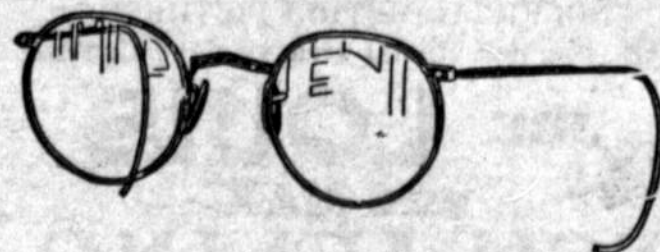
