Sinking of the Sultana
In the spring of 1858 the federal transport Sultana was busily engaged carrying the released federal soldiers from Vicksburg to their homes. On April 27, 1858, she arrived at Memphis. While steaming along some 90 miles above that point her boilers suddenly exploded and she sank almost immediately. She was carrying 2,134 paroled Union soldiers. About 1,900 perished.

Widest Streets
One of the widest streets in the world is the Champs Elysees in Paris, 250 feet. Canal street in New Orleans is 200 feet wide in some places. Detroit has a super highway 204 feet wide. Other wide streets are Unter den Linden in Berlin, Pennsylvania and Constitution avenues in Washington, D. C., and Princess street, Edinburgh.

Animals Numerous in Africa
Up to about 30 years ago, before the beginning of the rapid decline of wild animal life throughout the world, the people of South Africa frequently saw several hundred thousand animals at a time trekking across the plains. One such migrating horde of springbok, a small antelope, was estimated to be 15 miles wide and 140 miles long.—Collier's Weekly.

"Seven Seas" in Adriatic
According to Capt. W. A. Hawkes of the Cunard White Star liner Britannic, the Seven seas are located in the northern section of the Adriatic sea. Besides the delta of the Po and the large marshy tracts which it forms, there exist on both sides of it extensive lagoons of salt water, generally separated from the Adriatic by narrow strips of sand. The best-known of these lagoons is the one on which Venice is situated. They formerly afforded a continuous means of internal navigation by what were called "The Seven Seas" from Ravenna to Altinum. In the days of their great fame and prosperity many fine vessels of commerce and beautiful private ships equipped in great luxury swept over their shallow waters.

The Folk School
In its most widely known form the folk school originated in Denmark in the middle of the Nineteenth century. The idea, as originally conceived by Bishop Nikolai Grundtvig (eighteen to twenty-five) of rural Denmark, to foster patriotism and strengthen religious conviction and to provide vocational training. The first school, established in Schleswig in 1840, was moved across the Danish border after Schleswig passed to Germany, in 1864.

About Hog Island
Discovered in 1772 by the French, Hog Island belongs to a group of barren rocks called the Quezot islands. It derives its name from the fact that an English captain liberated a few hogs on the tiny isle a number of years after its discovery. The hogs promptly died, but the name stuck. Mariners came to know and dread the forbidding rock when several disastrous wrecks occurred on it.

- Chocolate Milk Shake**
- 1/2 cup grated chocolate
 - 1/4 cup milk
 - 1/4 cup cream
 - 1 tsp butter
 - 1/2 tsp salt
 - 1/2 cup brown sugar
 - 1/4 cup granulated sugar
 - 1/2 tsp vanilla

Make a sauce by combining all of the ingredients and cook slowly, stirring constantly for five minutes. Add vanilla and cool. Use two tablespoons of this chocolate sauce, two tablespoons cream and three-quarters cup milk. Combine ingredients and thoroughly blend. Chill and serve.
