The seventh again saw Coquille scoring, this time three tallies on three hits, a walk and a brace of boots. The ninth run came in the eighth canto.

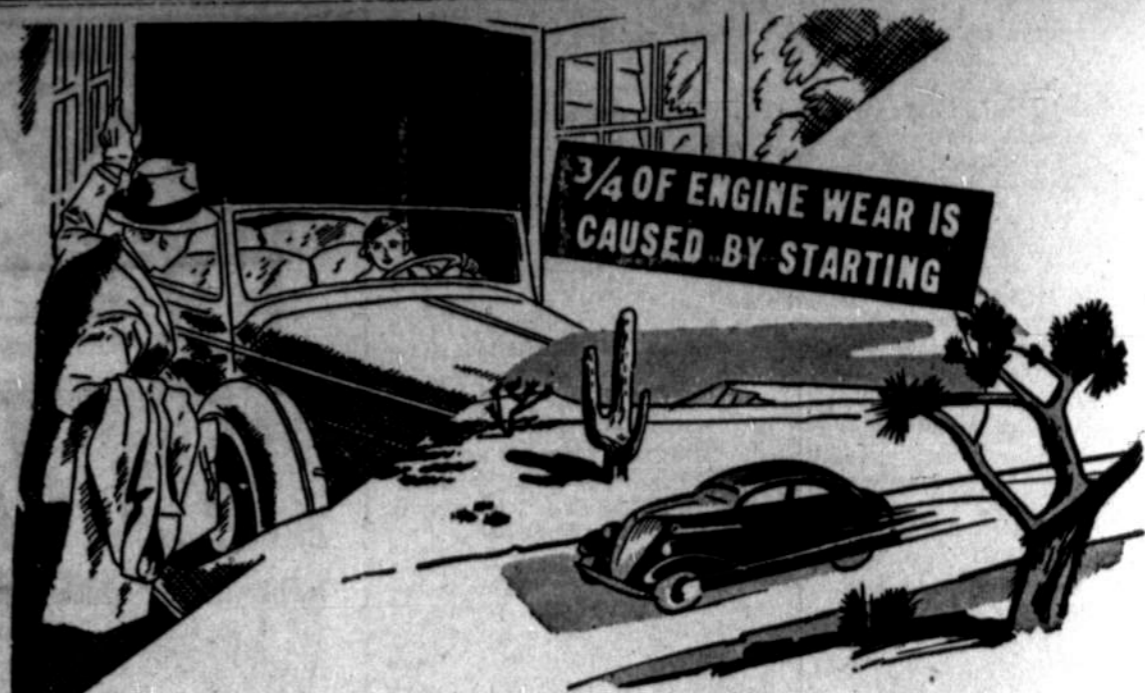
One Roseburg score crossed in the first on Catcher Goff's homer and the other in the sixth.
