Dr. T. de la Rhue An Author

Book lovers of this city will be interested in knowing that we have an author in our midst. Dr. T. de la Rhue, formerly of Portland and now located in Coquille, has an established record as a writer. His latest book, "Spanish Trails," will be published in September by the Caxton Printers, Ltd. The following article about the publication appeared in a news circular sent out by the Caxton Co.

"Typical of the thousands fleeing Spain and King Philip's 16th-century Inquisition were those who congregated at Malaga and joined the expedition of Don Ramon Davidas. Noblemen, merchants, artisans, soldiers of fortune—all persecuted by the Inquisitors—embarked in deep-bellied ships for the New World. The story of their escape, voyage to Mexico, and terrible journey over the Camino de Dolores to California is told in a panoramic historical novel, 'Spanish Trails,' by Dr. T. de la Rhue, of Portland, Oregon."

Dr. de la Rhue has done extensive traveling through southern Latin countries for authentic material for this and other books. A travelogue on which the doctor is now working will be published soon. His books are cleverly illustrated with his own sketches.

Blocking and bodily contact are the chief items on which officials differ, and he stressed the need of an organization of officials from all over the U. S. in order that uniform interpretation of the rules might make the game the same in the west and east, north and south. Basketball is a big major sport in the east and draws crowds of 18,000 to 20,000 where the auditorium permits.
