State Officers to Enforce Law on Smokers in Forests

A rigid enforcement of the forest law of the state which prohibits the throwing of lighted material along the highways of the state was announced today by State Forester J. W. Ferguson. Not only have orders been issued from the forestry department to all wardens for a strict enforcement of the law, together with the inauguration of special road patrols in certain hazardous areas of the state, but Charles P. Pray, superintendent of state police, has heartily endorsed the move and pledged his support and co-operation through the issuance of orders to his personnel to make a special effort to stop this practice.

"We are now entering the most critical period of the fire season," stated Mr. Ferguson, "for records of past years show that the most disastrous fires occur after the first of August. This year there is a definite increase in the hazard over past years because of a favorable spring with frequent rains which has resulted in an unusually dense growth of grass and weeds. With the coming of the hot, dry weather and the drying out of this growth, it has resulted in one

of the most hazardous fire situations that has faced the department in a number of years.

"This law which prohibits the throwing away of lighted material has been in effect for the past eleven years and an intensive educational campaign has been carried on to inform the public of the fact and to secure its co-operation. Nevertheless, the number of these fires is far too great and a determined effort will be made to reduce them through law enforcement."

Suggestions for Summer Bride

Preparing meals for two is a problem in any situation but if the "two" happen to be bride and groom this problem of meal planning and preparation can very easily become acute. Very often the bride is inexperienced as a cook. Undoubtedly she has helped her mother prepare the vegetables, and she may bake cakes that melt in your mouth, but the responsibility for getting the meal as a whole onto the table in edible form hasn't been hers. In her desire to impress and please her young husband, the bride is inclined to plan too elaborate a menu.

Our first suggestion is that the meals be kept simple and that they be planned well in advance—no last minute rushing to the corner grocery. Men prefer simple foods to the intricate combinations and if meals are kept simple there is a greater chance that they will be consistently satisfactory. Then, too, there is a greater chance of staying within the food budget.

Avoid trying more than one new dish at a time. Spread the fun out—it's easier and safe, too, all round. And remember that cold foods should always be served very cold and hot foods on a hot palate.

The bride must also learn to consider individual taste for foods. There seems to be some proof for the saying that men's appetites are different from women's. For instance, men are likely to drink more milk than women drink—which is so much better for the men. Women should drink more milk (as milk is recognized as our most important food for maintaining health and is not a fattening food.) But women usually eat more salads than men—which is so much better for the women, especially when the salads are made of raw fruits or vegetables. Therefore, we find a happy balance the most satisfactory solution.

A very simple and correct guide for meal planning should be helpful. If individuals are to maintain the highest measure of efficiency and buoyant health, meals must be built around the "protective" foods—milk, fruits and vegetables, and eggs. Once these foods are established in the

daily dietary, we can add any other foods desired. As one eminent authority on foods expresses it—"Eat what you want after you eat what you should." And by exercising the imagination one can create dishes that make the foods we "should" eat as appealing as those we "want."

Below is a recipe for a new dish that is bound to find favor with the unsuspecting male:

Melon-and-Cottage-Cheese Salad

Peel a chilled ripe cantaloupe as you would an apple. Slice it in rings about one and a half inches thick. Remove the seeds. Place the melon rings on a bed of lettuce. Season cottage cheese with grated orange rind and chopped nuts. If it seems dry add a little cream. Fill the centers of the melon rings with the cottage cheese. Slice some ripe fruit and arrange around the base of the cheese mound. Serve with any tart French dressing.
